#### Dear Friends

At a recent church meeting I attended, not in our church, a woman said to me, "we have no children, no young people to speak of, our congregation is aging and things aren't the way we want to be, but please, our worship traditions, they are very dear to us. I don't want to see them changed." A friend of mine, in his late 30s, said about the Church of Scotland and the same-sex debate that if the Church didn't get a grip and realise that we're in the C21st and not

the C19th, we might very well be witnessing the church's last gasp of breath as it disappears into the cultural ether, and that people under 40 simply see the Church standing for discrimination and wondering when was the last time the Church was so far out of step with the cultural milieu within which it exists.

In our own congregation, when we attempt to do something different in worship, or in social events and fundraisers, these can often be met with equal bouquets and brickbats. "I haven't been so excited and thrilled in Church for a long time." "I'm confused and I think I'll just go home." "I suppose it was interesting but not really my thing." "Don't ever do that again."

I have often wondered that if those followers of Jesus gathering in Jerusalem a few weeks after the crucifixion and resurrection events, waiting and unsure, would have bothered to establish the Christian Church if they knew what was going to happen. The splits; the fights; the unchristian, uncharitable, uninspiring and unhealthy nonsense that has marred so much of Christianity from its beginning and is still clearly evidenced to this day.

And yet, because of what they did, or despite what they did, and because or despite us, God's Holy Spirit still moves. When we are down-hearted – the Spirit moves; when we want to pack it in – the Spirit moves; when we are appalled by intemperate language or behaviour by

people who call themselves Christians – the Spirit moves; when we are the ones who appal others because of our own intemperate language or behaviour – the Spirit moves.

I wish God would get a move on and show us what He wants for

His Church. I wish God would give us the heroes and heroines of faith who would lead us forward, and inspire us by their commitment and action and wisdom. What God has given is us – you and me; and God has trusted us – you and me – to get on with it and show that we do care, that we can change, that we will move forward, that faith is still relevant to our world today. There are times when that does not seem enough; but it is, because the Holy Spirit of God is still moving. It is time we moved with that Spirit too.

#### KIRK SESSION NOTES

At its recent meeting the Kirk Session received reports from:

#### **Communications Committee**

- **Data Protection** Irene Wilson had given a talk to the group about the working implications of data protection requirements.
- Banners additional banners are being arranged to advertise the Baby & Toddler group meetings and weekly church services; smaller and less obtrusive notices had been installed for CCTV; with the help of Doreen Reekie, a new Welcome Pack was nearing finalisation
- Leaflets -Ewan Brown thanked all involved in the production, collation and distribution of 5000 leaflets to the parish for Christmas and Easter. It was an important part of the church's outreach and it required the continued support of all involved.
- Magazine 140 are now distributed by email, only 1 by post. Colour printing is kept to a minimum. 320 are printed each month (excluding July, August and January) and a small team meets to fold and bag the magazine and Life & Work on the Friday before the first Sunday of the month. Large print copies are also produced. A recording of each magazine is done by 3 teams of 2/3 people and the Moderator and distributed by Helen Buist along with recordings of the Church services.
- Website We are still looking for a website administrator

#### **Health and Safety Committee**

The Session heard about several areas of work involving ensuring the safety of the
congregation, staff members and members of the public using our buildings. As if it
were planned(!) during a discussion on ongoing fire drills, the fire alarm was sounded
to ensure the Session knew how to exit the building in case of a fire.

Nicola Whyte, our associate, reported that there would be an event for teenagers voting for the first time in the forthcoming Referendum, helping them to imagine Scotland's future. Secondary schools and local churches have been contacted and there is hoped to be a good turn-out of young people at this event on the evening of 6<sup>th</sup> June.

The Kirk Session heard with thanks about the continuing generosity of the Friends of Morningside in providing funds for choral and organ scholarships, new wheelchair 'bays' in the church, and other important work.

#### **WORSHIP NOTES**

The Minister and Kirk Session have agreed that there will be changes to the beginning of the 10.30am Morning Worship, with effect from 25<sup>th</sup> May. This was after consultation with the Worship Committee, the Education Committee, and Sunday Club parents and grandparents. The aim is to see if rearranging the beginning of the service will allow for a more child-friendly approach to worship. The service will start with a children's hymn, a short prayer, one of the Bible readings, the Children's Time and then the offering. Children will be encouraged to participate wherever possible. After the children leave for crèche and Sunday Club, the choir will sing

the introit as we are led in to the adult part of the service which will include the usual prayers, the remaining reading, the anthem and the sermon. This will become the normal pattern of order of service until a review at the beginning of next year. This pattern will not apply to the traditional communion services in June, October and December, Remembrance Sunday, or at other family services. It is hoped the congregation will support this experiment as we seek to find ways to meet the changing needs of our congregation.

We will celebrate and share the Lord's Supper on 1<sup>st</sup> June at 9.30am and 10.30am. The thanksgiving service is at 6.30pm.

Pentecost, the day we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit to the Church, is on Sunday 8<sup>th</sup> June. You might want to mark the day by wearing something red to Church that day, red being the colour of the Holy Spirit! The 8<sup>th</sup> June will also be the last 9.30am and 6.30pm services until they resume on 7<sup>th</sup> September.

We hope to have a special service of music involving our choral scholars on Sunday 8<sup>th</sup> June at 6.30pm. Details in the weekly intimations.

Please note that there will be a **fire drill** on **8**<sup>th</sup> **June** at the 9.30am and 10.30am services. An evening service fire drill will be held later in the year.

#### THE GUILD



On Sunday 12<sup>th</sup> May, a special service was held in the village of Wamphray, in Dumfries and Galloway, to celebrate the life of The Very Rev Professor Archibald Charteris, who founded the Guild 127 years ago.

This remarkable Churchman also founded Life and Work, and also the Diaconate.

As part of the Guild's 125<sup>th</sup> Anniversary, a project was launched to restore the gravestone of Dr Charteris and his wife, and to erect a memorial stone in the churchyard at Wamphray. The restored stones were on display at Sunday's service which was conducted by Rev Adam Dillon, Parish Minister. An inspiring reflection was given by The Rt Rev Lorna Hood, and Mrs Marjorie Paton, the Guild National Convener, spoke about the founding of the Guild.

I quote from Marjorie's letter to Guild members. "It was a very affirming day for everyone and, as the Guild looks to the future, it is surely right to remember our roots and how and why the Guild began and has proved to be a powerful force in the Church."

#### A HUGE THANK YOU

The volunteers who run the Edinburgh Clothing Store would like to say a huge "thank you" to everyone who has made it possible for the Church to give £950.10 to the Clothing Store so early in the year.

As you know the Church has agreed to support the Clothing Store by giving it £1,500 each year but a contribution to this commitment early in the year is doubly appreciated. This is a tremendous help as finding money for running costs is extremely difficult. The Clothing Store receives no council or government funding and needs around £23,000 each year in order to pay the rent, heating, lighting insurance etc. We have a wonderful group of volunteers (9 of whom are members of this church), none of whom claim expenses and many of whom make other donations in kind, so we cannot reduce our overheads.

The need for the service we offer increases each year and, very sadly, over the past two years there has been a significant increase in the number of children being referred for help. What we offer is clothing, bedding, curtains and towels.

What we particularly need is

Clothing for men – especially winter jackets, fleeces, jumpers, T shirts and shoes.

- Clothing for children aged 2 -10 years
- Clothing for teenagers.
- Bath towels

Donations can be brought to Church any Sunday and left in the box marked ECS in the vestibule under the hymn books on the right hand side as you enter.

Once again, thank you, to all who voted for us at the end of last year and made it possible to win a one off grant of £3000 from the Bank of Scotland Community Fund. This has enabled us to buy a stock of new items which are usually in short supply.

The help given by the congregation over a number of years has been truly amazing and has definitely helped enormously in keeping the Clothing Store open and able to help the most needy in our community. Thank you all very much.



#### SUNDAY SCHOOL PICNIC - 20<sup>TH</sup> JUNE (1898)

The pic-nic to Newhailes on 20<sup>th</sup> June was in every way a great success. This was the third of these annual trips [from St Matthew's Church] and on each occasion the weather has been delightful. This year the children were specially fortunate in having, through the kindness of Sir Charles Dalrymple, so beautiful a place as Newhailes grounds to pic-nic in.

The children, 180 in number, accompanied by their teachers and some members of the congregation, left Morningside by a special train at 10.30, reaching Newhailes about 11. After a slight lunch all amused themselves in the finely-wooded park till Mr Milligan summoned them together for dinner at one o'clock. After dinner a long programme of races, both for girls and boys, attracted most of the children; but others amused themselves with cricket, swings, Aunt Sally and other games.

Tea was served about 5; and then, while the children played among the trees, the Ladies' Committee provided a very welcome cup of tea to the older people, whose numbers had been considerably reinforced as the afternoon wore on. After tea Mrs Milligan presented the prizes won at the sports and then it was time to form into column and march to the station, whence a special train carried the happy party safely home about 8 o'clock.



The children all enjoyed themselves most thoroughly. No accident happened to any of them; while their behaviour was exceedingly good. They were asked to do no harm to Sir Charles Dalrymple's shrubberies and trees and so well did they obey that Mr Bryce, the head gardened, praised them highly for their good conduct.
