I recently took one of these services. There is no space in this particular home so the service has to take place in what is effectively a corridor through a sitting area. There's a piano there, and the seats are turned round to face it. I remain hugely grateful to our rota of pianists and those from the congregation who sometimes help boost the singing.


Numbers are rarely more than a handful and this day there were five people. One lady, wrapped in a blanket, ate from packet of crisps а surreptitiously; one lady. whose short-term memory had gone, sang all the words of the hymns from her childhood

memories; one gentleman looked stern throughout the service, but warmly thanked me with a two-handed handshake at the end; one lady, smartly dressed, had missed the beginning of the service but was happy to have made it for the end when we sang her favourite hymn, The King of Love my Shepherd is; one lady, eyes brimming with tears, said she was so grateful to be part of 'her church' again after weeks in hospital.

Someone doing a time-and-motion study would consider this not a good use of time. Some might question the point of singing

hymns with such small numbers, or giving a short talk to those whose memories were not good.

For me, on that cold February Wednesday afternoon, I read the familiar hymn to love from I Corinthians 13. It was nearly Valentine's Day, and I talked about love, evoking memories of cards from the loved ones in the past, and the fact that God's love was for more than one day. It was very simple, it did not involve any complex theology, but on that day, and in that place, for me at least. something special happened.



rarely be manufactured, they come unbidden, but they leave a mark. They remind us that the family of God is found in places; they remind us that many sometimes, when we least expect it, God reaches out and touches hearts and minds and bodies and souls.

Be grateful for those moments when they occur. God is greater, and sometimes more intimately personal, than we give Him credit.

# **KIRK SESSION NOTES**

At the February meeting of the Kirk Session:

- The Christian Education Committee reported, noting the forthcoming Lent Study group; the need for volunteers for crèche and Sunday Club (mentioned elsewhere in this magazine;
- The Worship Committee reported, mentioning a special event and service taking place on May 10<sup>th</sup> and 11<sup>th</sup> "Hands across the world" which will chime in with the theme at this year's General Assembly, and also incorporate some of the work of Christian Aid. More information will appear in a later magazine. There will be occasional opportunities to have Communion at the 9.30am service. The Kirk Session looked forward to the return of our organist, Morley Whitehead, and was grateful to the organ scholar, Miriam Abraham, whose willing and resourceful

commitment far exceeded what might reasonably have been expected from a scholar; the Session was also grateful to the choral scholars and to the choir for helping maintain our musical tradition in what had been a testing time.

- The Session broke into smaller groups for discussion, and wrestled with these questions: Honestly answer the question, "Why in the world would anyone want to come to this Church?" What one word would describe 2013 in our Church? What can we do in practical terms to make our congregation more attractive to more people? What worked and we should do more of? What didn't work and we should change? Where should we be increasing/decreasing our expenditure? How can we more effectively touch people's lives?
- These statistics produced from the 2011 Scottish Census gave us a very different look at our parish from one we might have expected. They formed part of an ongoing discussion at the Kirk Session about what kind of Church we want to be in the future.

#### **CHRISTIAN AID**

Christian Aid Week is looming once again and will run from 11th to 17th May. As usual the week will start with the joint service which will take place in St Fillan's Episcopal Church at 6.30pm on Sunday 11th May. St

Fillan's can be found just off Braid Road at the entrance to the Buckstone housing estate. It would be good if as many as possible could make an effort to attend on that evening in support of the Cause which is truly ecumenical, covering as it does, all the Christian denominations in Morningside and Fairmilehead.

I am appealing to those who have helped with the House-to House Collection in our Parish in the past to lend a hand once again and, in addition, to ask those who may not have been able to help with this task before to come forward with an offer to help. This is the main fundraising effort of Christian Aid and last year raised just over £4,000 from the Parish. All it needs in terms of time is 3/4 hours to deliver and uplift envelopes from houses within the Parish during the week. We are not able to cover the whole Parish due to insufficient collectors and so it would be good if we could extend the number of houses covered by enlisting help from those who have not previously been able to lend a hand.



#### **BASIC CHRISTIANITY**

As we approach Easter, we travel through a time of reflection and study, traditionally called Lent. It is a good time for people to think about their faith, what they understand and what they don't understand. It is a good time to consider what it means to be a Christian today, and what the implications of faith are for the way we live and the way we interact with the world around us. A course called Basic Christianity will be offered on Thursdays for those who would like to explore what they believe a little more deeply, and prepare for the good news of Easter. It started on 20<sup>th</sup> February and will run through to 27<sup>th</sup> March, at 7.30pm in the Cluny Centre The course is also suitable for those thinking about church membership. Each evening is a 'stand-alone' evening so you can come to as many of the evenings as is possible.

#### A LENT STUDY GROUP

is planned to start on Monday 17<sup>th</sup> March, for 4 weeks at 10:30-12 noon, meeting in the Lounge at 14 Maxwell Street. The basis will be material developed by Action of Churches Together in Scotland (ACTS), using Scripture to reflect on themes of Justice, Wisdom, Compassion and Integrity (the values inscribed on the Scottish mace). # EFFECTIVE LISTENING – FOR LIFE, HEALTH AND COMMUNITY

This course may be of interest to anyone who would like to improve their listening skills in everyday situations – to family or friends, or folk they visit casually or in the course of their service as elder or church visitor.



This is an informal interactive course with a mix of teaching, discussion, modelling and time to practise listening and be listened to. It will run over four sessions on two Saturdays from 10am-4pm 26<sup>th</sup> April and 10<sup>th</sup> May 2014, and will be held in the Chaplaincy Centre on the Heriot-Watt University campus at Riccarton. The cost is £40 (participants are expected to attend all sessions). Further information and application leaflets will be available in the vestibule.

Do you **really** listen? Or are you waiting to come in with your own story, or offer a solution, or perhaps you are too distracted by your own concerns, or wanting to ask lots of questions? Could you offer a listening ear when someone just needs to be heard?
