Dear Friends

In the season of remembering which falls around the end of October and beginning of November there are many events that call us to remember, stop, think, and wonder about death. There is the Remembrance service on the second Sunday November, when we reflect on the impact of war and peace. There is also, in some parts of the Christian Church the celebrations surrounding All Saints (originally Hallows) and All Souls festivals. It is a time when people remember the saints of the

Church, past and present. It is a time to remember those whose lives in great or small ways have added something to the Kingdom of God. But it is a time to reflect on the reality of death.

How we remember the dead is a sensitive subject. In a modern

world that has for a variety of reasons taken death mostly out of the home and into the hospital, so something of the natural order of life and death is diminished. Many dying people express a wish to die at home, surrounded by the things, and the people, familiar to them. It is rarely something we get the chance to choose.

Whether at home, or in hospital, or on a battlefield or in some tragic accident, humans find different ways to mark death. Some will ignore it or hide it away. Some will be immobilised by it and find re-entry into the everyday world hard, or even impossible, after a bereavement. Some will plant flowers and trees. Some will leave donations so that a cure for illness might be found, or give to a charity that makes the world a better place. Some will have elaborate services church in and crematorium or by a graveside. Others will go for something simple and gentle.

Benjamin Franklin wrote, "In this world nothing can be said to be certain, except death and taxes." Our Christian faith does inoculate against death, consistently gives us something to hold on to and to hope for - the promise that

> whatever happens - God will still hold us. There are few if any significant descriptions of life after death given in the Bible other than that promise that God will still hold us. The closest, and most helpful, image is given by Jesus in John's Gospel when He talks about a house that holds many rooms - a

clear implication that there is a place for all.

In this season of All Saints, and in the time of Remembrance, see the reality of death not as a threat or a thing of fear, but as a stepping-stone from one existence to another. It is a comma, not a full stop. Remember those people who have been part of your story, the good, the bad, and the indifferent, and let them rest in God's keeping. Then, knowing that you are held by God, get on with living the rest of your life to the full, like the Saint of God that you are.

MUSIC NOTES

On Saturday 28th November at 7.30pm there is to be a concert in Morningside Parish Church. The aim is partly to cheer the dark winter evenings and partly (of course!) to raise money for the church – for helping to make sure of its Christian witness in the centre of Morningside. (The proceeds from the summer concerts were specifically to fund a (very valuable) fifth choral scholar in the choir: this is different.)

Fund-raising or not, it will be an evening of most enjoyable music. A good friend and colleague, Alison Rushworth, has already got together a small string orchestra, and the programme will include: Serenade for Organ and Strings by Hans Gál; Capriol Suite by Peter Warlock; and the wonderful and exuberant Concerto for Organ, Strings and Timpani, by Francis Poulenc (Morley Whitehead at the organ). Some of our excellent line-up of choral scholars will be making solo appearances too.

Tickets will cost £8 (£4 for students or under 18s), to include light refreshments at the interval, and wine will also be available. They can be obtained from the Church Office and from members of the Stewardship & Finance committee on the Sundays leading up to the concert.

The television of a Saturday evening is not worth watching. Instead, take a moment to mark this event in your diary and come along and enjoy what the various musicians are doing as they give their services to your church.
