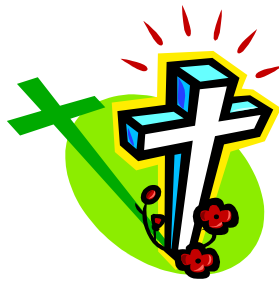

Dear Friends

Miss Prism, the governess of Cecily Cardew in Oscar Wilde's play *The Importance of Being Earnest* says, "Memory... is the diary we all carry about with us." The poet Thomas Hood wrote, "I remember, I remember the house where I was born, the little window where the sun came peeping in at morn." Children going out guising on the 5th of November used to chant, "Remember, remember the fifth of November, the Gunpowder treason and plot..." (It goes on to say things perhaps not well-suited to these more ecumenical times!)

Memory, remembering, these are fundamental aspects of who we are for our memories often shape what we are. Memories come from our childhood and form our relationships, our work and the way we believe.

Somewhere near the heart of the faith tradition we belong to is the building up of memory. In what was largely an oral culture this is part of the explanation of why so many of the stories in the Old Testament are repeated, and so many phrases are repeated. For example, "The steadfast love of the Lord endures for ever." Repetition was used to get the point home, to help people remember the things that were important about God, and about God's relationship with His people. Remembering is also at the heart of the church's meal – communion. "This do in Remembrance of Me."



November is a season for remembrance in so many ways. It starts with what has become known as All Saints' Tide – a time when some Christian traditions remember those 'saints' of all generations – people who have lived faithful lives – and give thanks for their memory. Not all saints are necessarily the ones who are remembered in stained glass windows. Like many of the unsung heroes in life, most saints will have lived ordinary lives, doing ordinary things, but somehow making an extraordinary difference in the lives of those around them. There is a fine biblical tradition that sees all

people of faith as 'saints', or enhanced in life by their faith and the way they live it. Churches, for all that we know they can be gatherings of sinners, are supremely a kindergarten for saints. It's how Paul, in his letters to some of the early Christians, saw them; they, and we, are "called to be saints".

In this season of remembering, that's worth recalling. Not that we ought to think too highly of ourselves, but equally that we do not have such a low self-esteem that we think we are of no value. Remember, we are called, chosen, and named. Remember with thanksgiving what others have enabled you to do and to become; remember that you too, in your own way, are also a saint of God, called by Him to shine a light in the darkling world. Remember, you too can shine!

KIRK SESSION

At the October meeting of the Kirk Session:-

The Property Committee reported on its extensive work at the Church, Halls, Cluny Centre and the Manse in recent months. The Session was pleased to hear that, with the support of the Friends of Morningside, brass rails have been fitted at the south transept doorway to the hall, and an iron rail has been fitted within the north transept. Both railings will alert people to the steps from one level to another. As has been intimated, because of three separate thefts of lead from the Church Hall roof over a period of six months, extensive work is being carried out to make that area more secure. A railing is being situated above the Cluny Gardens hall

doorway, anti-climb paint is being applied, and the replaced lead on the roof will be coated with a substance that will make it unsellable, as well as being marked with 'smart water' so it could be identified at a scrap merchants if someone attempted to sell it on. CCTV cameras and lights have been installed, and these are linked to the Church security system. Electronic bollards are being installed at the Cluny Garden driveway. During the day time and evenings when the church or halls are in use, the bollards will be lowered, but overnight they will be raised to prevent vehicular access up the driveway. The Session noted its sadness that these steps were necessary but realised that the theft of lead, and its replacement, was an expensive business and insurance companies were becoming less willing to pay out.

Elders' Districts - reorganisation: After an extensive consultation with the congregation and with the Session, the new elders' districts will become operational from November 2013. The districts have not been reviewed for ten years, since the time of the union, and many of them were growing too small, or getting too large as the population of the congregation 'moved'. Also, in the light of the 2012 consultation, many people in the congregation opted for the majority of their communication from the church via email, with a few opting for post. (These options still remain open – there is a reasonable saving, for example, in having the magazine emailed to you; hard copies are also available on the Welcome Desk, at the pigeon holes, and in the Cluny Centre. If you would like to receive information from the Church, including your communion invitation and the magazine via email, please contact the church office: office@morningsideparishchurch.org.uk). At this time a number of elders also intimated they wished to step down from district duties.

The number of districts has been reduced from 64 to 20 (one of them is a postal district). Some districts will be visited by one elder, but most districts will now have two or three elders assigned to them. However, you will have only one elder visiting you and the elders in the 'team' districts will be working out in their districts who will visit whom. Working in teams will, we hope, provide 'cover' for districts at times when elders are on holiday or unwell.

The Kirk Session affirmed its commitment that **all** members of the congregation would get at least one face-to-face visit a year, with others who had requested it a twice yearly visit; the majority of members will get a quarterly visit tied in with the Communion season either because they requested this, or because they made no response to the congregational survey. Elders will confirm with members that they are happy with the number of visits they are receiving and agree with them whether they would like fewer, or more, visits.

The Session hoped that those members of the congregation who may be getting new elders will welcome them warmly and be supportive and appreciative of this important work that is carried out in God's name.

The Kirk Session expressed its gratitude to the small group who worked with the Minister to carry out this major pastoral and administrative task, and thanked in particular the Roll Keeper, Moira Clark, who carried out the bulk of this complex work.

Many of you are aware that I was in India with Scottish Love in Action last winter, and generously gave me a variety of craft items to take to be used in the orphanage. I enjoyed the whole experience so much and felt that the need was so great, that I've decided to go back this November.

At the moment SLA is running a project to raise funds to build a new dormitory for the youngest boys who are currently sleeping on the floor of the dining room. The boys' dormitories are about a kilometre away from the main campus and the boys are compelled to walk along a narrow country road, with grassy verges, to reach them. The verges have become a breeding ground for poisonous snakes and scorpions and construction of a new motorway nearby has turned the little road into a busy rat run. It is felt to be too dangerous for the younger boys to make the journey any longer; hence the urgent need for a new dormitory.

£5 buys two bricks, so one brick is about the price of a coffee in any of our coffee shops. Please give up one coffee to help the children in Tuni. The need is very urgent.

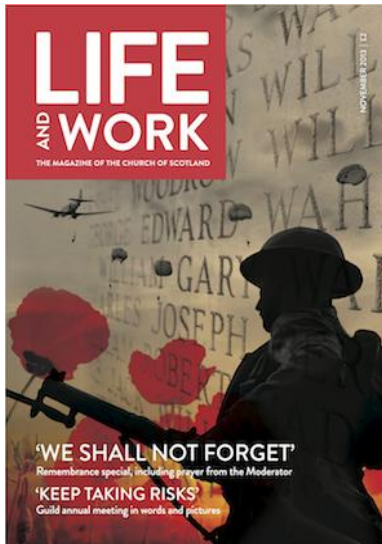

MESSY CHRISTMAS

LADIES GROUP

Alan Irving informed us about how and why **The Edinburgh High Constables** were formed and their present role today. They originally helped with law and order but now their role is more ceremonial along with fundraising. The City is divided into areas with each having their own members who are invited to join the ranks.

Four members of The Edinburgh Tenners (all reside within EH10) gave us an insight into how this group was formed to stitch one of the 160 panels of the **Scottish Tapestry**. The tapestry was on show recently at the Scottish Parliament when about 30,000 people came to see it. This project started with an idea by Alexander McCall Smith, the author, and involved artist Andrew Crummy to design and historian Alistair Moffat to oversee it. The stitchers were volunteers had a wide range of experience. They were given the basic design for panel 5, which depicted 'The Wildwood and its Fauna c.8,500 BC', but they were allowed to choose their stitch design and any extras.

This Tapestry returns for another display but this time at Cockenzie House and Gardens, 22 Edinburgh Road, Cockenzie from 19th October to 8th December. It is well worth visiting but allow at least three hours for viewing as there are 160 panels to see depicting our history. There is refreshment at the house. The number 26 bus to Port Seton will take you there, check with the driver before getting on.
