Dear Friends

This year's Holy Week services will be exploring the theme of the Jesus we find in Luke's Gospel. It may come as a surprise to some that Jesus is portrayed in slightly different ways in the four gospels, and this is because each of the gospels has a slightly different emphasis in the way they seek to present the life of Jesus. Matthew, it is believed, wrote to Jewish Christians; Mark, the first gospel, is likely to have relied on the memories of Peter; John's gospel, the

last to be written, is more theological and philosophical when it talks of Jesus and His message. Luke's themes are aimed at the non-Jewish community from which He came, feature healing miracles (Luke was a doctor), and speak more about sacrifice than the other gospels.

The way we picture Jesus throughout the year, as well as during Holy Week and Easter, matters. Jesus was real, attested to by ancient documents outwith the Bible. Jesus was a multidimensional character, not a onedimensional stained glass window. Jesus was Jewish, and a child of the Middle East. Jesus lived in an ethnically diverse community, and is likely to have spoken at least three languages

(Hebrew, Aramaic and Greek). Jesus was someone who worked for His living. As well as being a teacher and healer and all the other things we associate with Jesus. Luke gives us a very accessible picture of Jesus.

Which is what makes the events of Holy Week almost unbearable to read. This vulnerable, just like us Jesus, put through Hell, betrayed, abandoned, brutalised, killed. How could anyone do this to another human being? How could God let this happen?

Travelling through Holy Week with Jesus, from Palm Sunday to Easter, we are faced with as many questions as we are answers, and as much cause for doubt as there is cause for faith. Nevertheless at the end of it all. I

find myself emerging from the darkness and pain and disbelief. For in the Easter story I find, or maybe better am found, by the vulnerable God Who chose to stand alongside His people, not above them, or beyond them. Immanuel, God with us – not only at Christmas, but on Good Friday, and at Easter.

This is the Good News. This we celebrate when the promise of Easter breaks upon us once more.

KIRK SESSION MEETING

At the February Kirk Session:

- A report from the recent meeting of committee conveners who had met with a representative from the Presbytery to talk about the Local Church Review of a few years ago. Our congregation was complimented on the breadth of our activities. There was also talk about the opportunity of developing what might be called 'Andrew Projects' reaching out to the community. Possibilities might include a midweek mid afternoon service, and perhaps some consideration about the large student population living in Morningside. The Session recognised that whilst there was no cause for complacency, an increasing number of our church activities purposefully reached out to a wide cross-section of the community and parish.
- Education Committee. The convener reported on the steadily growing numbers of young people at Sunday Club, and on the ongoing success of involving young people in worship.
- The Session Clerk updated progress on discussions with the architects about the proposed new buildings. Plans were still being developed, and particular thought was being given to disabled access.
- The Property Committee reported that the storm-damaged notice board at the Braid Road entrance to the Church would be replaced at a cost of £2,490.

BETHANY CHRISTIAN TRUST WINTER CARE SHELTER



Dear Friends,

Thank you all very much indeed for the wonderful support we have received from Morningside Parish Church towards the work of the Bethany Care Shelter this winter. As one of your 3 supported charities in 2015 we have received the extremely generous sum of £2,739 from the special collections at your Church over the course of the year.

This generosity from your Church has been a great help for Bethany to continue to provide the vital and potentially lifesaving Care Shelter service in the winter months from October to April for people who have been reduced to sleeping rough, often due to a downward spiral of events beyond their control.

These people all have their own individual story to tell about the sequence of events which has led them to being homeless and having to sleep rough, but the common factor is that all are hungry, cold, lonely, frightened and often depressed, so the Care Shelter provides a place of warmth, friendship and safety.

The donation total from Morningside Parish Church has provided at least 91 bed spaces in the Shelter this winter based on an average cost of £30 per person per night, which is very helpful as we have been seeing a consistently high level of demand for spaces, with an average of 50 men and women coming to the Shelter every night.

The Winter Care Shelter serves some of the most vulnerable and hurting people in Edinburgh and is often the only expression of love, grace and compassion that these men and women experience in their daily lives. Quite simply it would not be possible to operate the Care Shelter without generous voluntary donations such as this from your Church.

Again thank you all very much for your wonderfully generous support and for choosing to support Bethany's work at this time of need in our capital city-this is very much appreciated by Bethany Christian Trust. We are also very grateful for the help of the Morningside Parish Church Care Shelter Catering Team led by Anne McNeil for providing a nutritious hot meal and breakfast for 50 homeless people on the nights your team was on the catering rota.

GIFT AID - A MILESTONE

You wouldn't probably be aware but this year, during January, we were running a Gift Aid Declaration Campaign. The objective was to contact, by telephone or letter, everyone who gives by means of Free Will Offering (blue envelopes) or Standing Order to our bank who hadn't already provided us with a Gift Aid Declaration.

As of Wednesday 3rd February, we have achieved a situation whereby everyone in these regular giving categories has either completed a Gift Aid Declaration or confirmed that they are non-taxpayers. Yes, everyone! As a result, we have made an additional claim to HMRC for Gift Aid amounting to £731.25 and we'll get a little interest on top of that. This claim covers giving for the past four years by those individuals who hadn't before signed a Gift Aid Declaration.

Our members have responded superbly and, of course, it hasn't cost anyone a penny, apart from HM Revenue and Customs. Now every member who is giving on a regular basis has completed a Gift Aid Declaration or is not a tax payer, so that door has been closed and it's a proud boast that we can make about our members giving at Morningside Parish Church.

So, you'll understand why we're feeling really delighted. It's money for nothing, it's great!

If you could give by Standing Order or Free Will Offering (the blue envelopes) and currently don't, then we're all missing a trick. I would be delighted to meet you to explain further, go through the necessary paperwork and make it tax efficient.


The Donkey by G K Chesterton
