

What wild, radical, revolutionary said this? Step forward Her Majesty the Queen. She was speaking about the role of the Commonwealth of Nations. She could, however, have been speaking about any other community or institution in our city, country or world. As a committed and public Christian, the Queen, in this statement, offers a view that challenges many of the prejudices that afflict contemporary society. No room here for Islamophobia, anti-Semitism, misogyny, homophobia, racism or ageism. It certainly challenges some of the views held by some within the Church

who follow an excluding path, rather than embracing a generous orthodoxy. Or, as another world leader. Pope Francis. recently said: "A person who thinks only about building walls, wherever they may be, and not building bridges, is not Christian. This is not the gospel."

> Neither the Queen, nor the Pope, is likely to imagine that what they have said is easy. These comments lead further questions, particularly

about how to carry them out, and live by them. Nevertheless there is graciousness and wisdom in what they have said. As our nation prepares for the Scottish Parliamentary elections in May, and the European Referendum in June, I believe we would do well to ask, in Jesus' Name, if we are seeking to lay, "the foundations of a harmonious and progressive society", and building bridges, and not walls? Faith and the example of Jesus play a part in all our decisions, including those we make about how we vote.

The Kirk Session, as Trustees of the congregation, approved the accounts at its March meeting. There will be an opportunity to view the accounts and ask questions, and hear a little more about the progress of our new building plans.

KIRK SESSION MEETING

At its March meeting the Kirk Session heard reports on:

- Stewardship & Finance The Annual Accounts and commentary had been circulated in advance. The Treasurer introduced the accounts prepared by Greenbank Accountants and examined by Whitelaw Wells. Anne Dobson then went over the figures in more detail. The income for the year to 31.12.15 was £343,830 (£366,719 in 2014) and expenditure of £367,507 (£374,041 in 2014). The deficit was £23,677 (£7,322 in 2014). On the income side the main differences were a drop in offerings and donations and no legacies being received. A drop in Gift Aid tax recoveries had been due to an exceptional year in 2014 when there had been a catch up in sums recovered. The reduction in expenditure was achieved despite an increased payment to Ministries & Mission. Session approved the accounts.
- The Guild Marie Ogilvie advised that the Guild committee had resolved and were making a recommendation to the Guild members at their AGM that the branch be dissolved. As previously advised the branch had been affected by declining numbers and an inability, largely on account of age, to find members able and willing to take on the various leadership roles. All members had been notified and it was thought unlikely that the resolution would not be passed. The Guild is planning to mark its winding up by a special meeting including a lunch. Session noted with appreciation that it was the end of a long chapter in the life of all the churches which have now come together in Morningside Parish Church during which, over many years, much work, worship and fellowship had been enjoyed by the members and generous support given to the congregations and to the Guild movement nationally.
- Church Hall Development The Session Clerk, Robin Stimpson, reported that progress continued to be made. Following the consent of the Kirk Session and congregation, approval had been obtained in principle from the Presbytery. An Application with outline plans had been submitted, with the formal approval and support of the Presbytery, to the General Trustees who earlier that day had agreed to the proposals. The General Trustees have also advised that we should also submit for consideration an application for a short term loan to cover funding the cash flow pending the receipt of the sale proceeds of the Centre. CARTA who advise on artistic matters relating to the interior of the Church met the Clerk, the Moderator and the Architects the previous day. A timeline for the completion of the project has been prepared by the architects indicating that time is tight but it should be possible to complete within our target date of autumn 2017. However one great uncertainty is the delays currently being experienced in the City Planning Department. Ideally the main work should start in the New Year although a contractor may be able to set up in the weeks prior to that. The marketing of the Cluny Centre may start relatively soon but it seems advisable to wait until the architects have been able to have a conversation with the planners in the light of finalised plans. Given that we now have clearance from the church authorities these plans can now be worked up.

- Review of the Roll Moira Clark, Roll-keeper, advised that the roll now stood at 435. She also tabled the full Roll and Session attested and authorised the signing of the attestation of the Roll.
- PVG Paul Cackette, Safeguarding Co-ordinator, presented the Safeguarding Register. Reflecting Data Protection issues, a summary of the register identifying names and clearance only had been circulated prior to the meeting and the full Register had been tabled.
