Dear Friends

A winner of the Nobel Prize in Physics was once asked why he became a scientist. He replied, 'My mother made me a scientist without ever knowing it. Every other child would come back from school and be asked, 'What did you learn today?' But my mother used to ask a different question. "Son," she always used to say, "did you ask a good question today?" That made the difference. Asking good questions made me a scientist.'

Faith, virtually every strand of Judaism. Christian. Muslim, is about asking auestions. In the Bible questions are being asked of God all the time, particularly in the Old Testament. The Book of Job is one long question about suffering and God's

response to it. Many of the Psalms raise questions about how and when and why is God near to His people. Jesus, in His teaching, would answer a question with a question, and kept His disciples, and the Pharisees and scribes, on their toes. It followed the Jewish custom of the earliest sermons, which started with the rabbi being asked something by a member of their congregation.

Religious faith has suffered considerably in the world today by being cast as naïve, blind and unquestioning. A scientist asks, someone once said, the believer 'just' believes. Religious belief is too often seen as the suspension of critical intelligence. One writer notes, "I respect faith, but doubt is what gets you an education."

In a recent venture in the national church, the 'pull up a pew' programme has given opportunities to people to question, wonder, raise issues about faith and the church. Mary Goodlad. the Hannah current Moderator of the Youth Assembly, asks, "Where are the places in church where people can go to ask questions?" My experience as a minister is that people are nervous about asking questions because they are afraid to reveal their own ignorance, or more difficultly, may be unprepared to accept an answer given. I

don't always relish having to deal with 'hard' questions, but I do often wonder when it was that the child's almost insatiable appetite for asking questions was turned off when we grew into adulthood.

Another writer notes that to ask is to believe that somewhere there is an answer. The fact that throughout

history people have devoted their lives to extending the frontiers of knowledge is a moving demonstration of the restlessness of the human spirit and its constant desire to transcend, to climb. Jonathan Sacks writes, "Far from faith excluding auestions. questions testify to faith - that the world is not random, the universe is not impervious to our understanding, life is not blind chance...Critical intelligence is the gift God gave humanity. To use it in the cause of human dignity and insight is one of the great ways of serving God...Faith is not opposed to doubt. What it is opposed to is the shallow certainty that what we understand is all there is."

Ask your questions in reverence. That is how to start a journey towards God.

KIRK SESSION

At its May meeting the Kirk Session heard reports from:

Communications: Isobel Paterson, the Communications convener. told Session that the new website is just under one year old, and feedback has been positive about its accessibility and its content. There is no Webmaster but instead different people manage different areas: the Minister puts up the sermons and the 'What's on' part of the front page; the Magazine Editor puts on the magazine and has also added magazines going back several years; the Church puts the Administrator on weekly Communications intimations and the Convener adds any new pages and photos.

The Magazine continues to be our main means of communicating with the congregation and is presented in print or email format. It is also well received.

Leaflets - These continue to be a very worthwhile means of communicating with the parish though delivering to 5,300 is a huge task. Use of the 'Minute for Mission' to encourage the congregation has been useful.

Morningside Messenger - For the wider public we submit monthly information that is published free of charge.

Weekly Email - The Minister devises a weekly information sheet that is sent to all whose emails we have. It's colourful and is effective as a reminder of the church and its immediate activities. September Leaflet - The idea is to add a third leaflet to the others that have been successful at Christmas and Easter. This one might talk about Harvest matters and Doors Open Day but would also publicise groups beginning at the start of session. The group is about to consider how to involve more people in the distribution of these since the task seems to have fallen on too few shoulders.

Health and Safety: the Kirk Session heard concerns from the convener, Moira Clark, about issues relating to health and safety for volunteers and church staff involved in property maintenance work around the Church. It noted that the national church is appointing a health and safety consultant, and the Kirk Session agreed to review the areas where concerns were greatest, particularly working at high levels.

Elders' visits to Organisations:

Throughout the year elders visit different organisations in the Church. The Session noted issues raised about the Sunday Club, Wednesday Men's Group and the Car Rota. With the Sunday Club, the gradual increase in numbers welcomed, but it was noted that the age range from 3 to 11 was too great a span for activities to be meaningful to all the children. The Session has asked that focused thought be given to splitting into two age groups for some of the education and craft work, whilst recognising the benefit of some activities for all. The Session noted that this would mean an increase in the number of volunteers willing to be involved in Sunday Club, but also felt there would be some benefit in seeking 'professional' advice about how to resource and manage the proposed changes. The report on the Sunday Club was very favourable about the quality and

the style of Sunday Club and its staff, and hopes that comments made will help improve even further the experience for the children. Both the Wednesday Men's Group and the Car Rota are faced with a growing need to recruit volunteers to help maintain their work, and this is something that the congregation will be invited to address.

New building update: Robin Stimpson, the Session Clerk, gave an update on the plans for the new building. Neighbours were being consulted, and plans were getting closer to submission.

Worship: the Minister gave information about an experiment, which will see three afternoon services being held on Tuesday or Thursday afternoons at 2.30pm, in the new Hall. There will be three trial services on 6th October, 13th December and 6th April. The services will include a couple of hymns, a reading, prayers and a short talk and will last around half an hour. Tea, coffee and refreshments will be served afterwards. If you would like to attend, or someone who know of might be interested, please let your elder know. It may also be possible to offer transport, but this will depend on having volunteers able to provide cars, and the numbers involved.

EDINBURGH PRESBYTERY – WORLD MISSION

To mark International Refugee Week, Scotland, (20-26 June) the Presbytery has organised an event that will take place on Saturday 25th June, from 10am until 12 noon in Polwarth Parish Church.

A number of organisations, who are all Edinburgh-based, that work either in Syria, or in the camps in surrounding countries. with those who reach or the Mediterranean, or come to be integrated into the city of Edinburgh, have been invited to provide table-top displays of their work in their chosen area along this Syrian Trail. Organisations that have been invited are: The World Mission Council, Mercy Corps, Christian Aid, Edinburgh Direct Aid, Edinburgh Cares, Edinburgh Inter Faith Association, Amnesty Scotland and Edinburgh Churches for Sanctuary.

Those that come can stay as long as they wish, and leave at any time over the two-hour period.

Anna Wright is a brilliant young performer, who has just been awarded a scholarship to study for two years in Canada, and sax and organ create a surprisingly interesting combination; medical student Zorbey Turkalp has this last year been one of our Choral Scholars at MPC, and will surely make a good case for these RVW settings of Robert Louis Stevenson; and Margaret Donaldson (sister of conductor Donald Runnicles) is a fine pianist, delighted to be "making her concert debut"(!) at MPC. MW should need little introduction...

All concerts begin at 1.10pm., lasting about 45 minutes. Free admission, but a retiring collection in aid of the funding of a fifth Choral Scholarship here at MPC. Do please come and support - and ENJOY!

CHORAL AND ORGAN SCHOLARSHIPS



Could you spare a couple of Wednesday evenings a year between October and March?

The Wednesday Club meets at the Cluny Centre at 7.30pm on Wednesday evenings between October and March providing an evening's entertainment for a group of disabled men. Volunteers are required, from 7:00pm onwards, to help with meeting the men from their transport and assisting them into the Centre, as necessary, talking to the men before the entertainment starts, assisting with the preparation and serving of refreshments, and helping to load the buses up again at the end of the evening. You also get a musical evening, slide show, video, or, if you are very lucky, a game of Bingo thrown in for free.

Over the past few years our group of volunteers has been depleted through the retirement of some through ill health and age. This has meant an increase in the number of evenings that the remaining volunteers require to cover. A further 9 volunteers would mean that we could return to our volunteers only having to cover two evenings per year.


