Dear Friends

It has been a momentous summer in the world of politics. I suspect most of us are suffering from a surfeit of news and much of it has been difficult to digest. The autumn contains more political decision making in the United Kingdom for the Labour party, and of course there will be the presidential elections in the United States in November. In all electoral campaigns, past and present, everyone seems to be promising a brave new world, where trouble, pain, crime, and fear will be no more, and that we will live at peace with our neighbours, and have money in our pockets to spare, food to eat and shelter to keep us safe and warm.

The reality is no politician can deliver such things, so their promises regularly ring hollow. For many people it seems that we are living at a time of depleting reserves of moral capital. Communities seem to be splintering, divisions seem deep, and the political uncertainty has led to a greater sense of fear and polarisation than I have known for many years. The former chief Rabbi Jonathan Sacks writes 'Communities are where we rehearse the virtues we need to build a better world. Moral principals are the compass that helps us navigate the undiscovered country called the future. When these are weak, we become insecure. When they are strong, we can walk with confidence whatever fate brings.' It is hard to have hope when you live in fear and uncertainty.

This bleeds from the political scene into personal lives, and the community, and also the Church. Yet it is precisely the gift of hope that the Church, through faith, can offer to individuals, and the wider community. We can offer the language of aspiration. We can offer the idea that whatever we are, we might be different. As a writer puts it, "We can grow and develop." This is what gives life meaning.

David Hume, an 18th century Scottish philosopher reminds us of the difference between what is and what ought to be. It is that difference that moves us to change the world, our personal lives, and our life of faith within the Church. People fall ill, so we practise medicine. People suffer, so we provide relief. Our society is built on the assumption that all that is wrong in the world is not inevitable. We can alter the way we behave. Faith sets out a vision for change. It may in time transform the Church, our politics, our economics, and our law. But first faith has to change us.

A rabbi once wrote: "When I was young, I wanted to change the world. I tried, but the world didn't change. Then I tried to change my town, but the town didn't change. Then I tried to change my family, but my family didn't change. Then I realised: first, I must change myself."

Good advice if we want to change the world, the church, or anything. Transform yourself first, with faith.

WORSHIP EVENTS

KIRK SESSION

At its June meeting the Kirk Session heard reports from:

Stewardship and Finance: Robert Armour, the convener, reminded Session that good progress had been made in reducing the revenue deficit which had been running at close to £90k p.a. For 2016 the approved budget is based on a deficit of £20k and he hoped that breakeven might be achieved by the end of 2017. He suggested that:

- a further Pledge Campaign should be run with a Pledge Sunday in September
- Members should be reminded of the cost of running the church and the different opportunities of contributing
- there should be a focus on encouraging legacies
- we undertake further fund raising activities including music concerts and an auction.

Associate for Christian Education and Pastoral Care: the Kirk Session received a letter of resignation from Helen Guy. (At the July meeting of the Kirk Session it was agreed to re-advertise the position in August).

PVG – thirty people attended a recent training event to highlight protection of children and vulnerable adults.

New Hall development and sale of Cluny Centre: These progress steadily, with plans now submitted, and ongoing discussions with central Church groups moving ahead. It is likely that the Cluny Centre will be marketed in the autumn, with the Church retaining the property until the summer of 2017.

SEPTEMBER AUTUMN LECTURES

This year's Autumn lectures will begin on Sunday 4th September. 6.30pm for drinks, 7pm for a short act of worship and the lecture. This year's theme will look at different forms of Chaplaincy.

Sunday 4th September – the Revd Chris Kellock, an army chaplain who was deployed to Africa during the ebola crisis.

Sunday 11th September – the Revd Sheena Orr, Chaplain to HMP Edinburgh (Saughton), who has also served as a prison chaplain in Africa.

Sunday 18th September – Anne Mulligan DCS, a recently retired chaplain at the Edinburgh Royal Infirmary.

Sunday 25th September – the Revd John McMahon, Chaplain at Broadmoor Hospital (and formerly minister at Polwarth and chaplain at the Royal Edinburgh Hospital).

Chaplaincies, and there are many others, interact with often very specific situations where most churches would not normally have an input, so provide a specialised form of spiritual care for their area of interest.




BEETLE DRIVE - SATURDAY 29TH OCTOBER 2016
