For all of us, privately and publicly, 2016 will have been a mixed year. Years are always like that. Hopes and fears, dreams and nightmares. That kind of mixture is found in the Christmas story, and you don't have to look too hard to find it. The incarnation of Jesus is never going to be sanitised or made pretty no matter how much tinsel we

put around it, or how often we try to hide behind, "Christmas is really for the children." Though there is beauty, awe and wonder in the Christmas story, there also pain, uncertainty and despair. All of these we find in the world, so all of these have

their place in the stories of Christmas.

As I write, those mixed feelings dominate our news with the result of the American presidential election. For some there is excitement and possibilities. I find myself with the others, perplexed and astonished.

I will not despair, though the world is turning upside down. I will not despair, though the hurts are real. I will not despair, though walls may be built. I will not despair, though light is flickering. I will not despair, because

hope will come. I will not despair, because truth will triumph. In all that has happened in our world in 2016, much of which has saddened and dismayed, faith will give the courage, the strength, the vision and the resilience that is needed. Divisions must be bridged, and all the children of faith must be the people to do this. I will not despair, for though my hopes and dreams have not always carried the day, I believe the arc of

God's justice bends inexorably towards mercy. We work steadily to see God's kingdom, in all its challenging discomfort, established. I will not despair, because there is, always, hope.

The story of Christmas has many meanings: it speaks to the elated and the despondent. It also

transcends the cares and worries of this present age. That is why the Christmas story *shines*. It shines in the world, despite everything. It shines in our private lives, despite everything. It shines because it tells of God with us, a light in every darkness, and a hope in every despair.

May the light and hope of Christmas suffuse your lives and your homes now and through the coming New Year.

KIRK SESSION

At its November meeting the Kirk Session heard reports from:

The Pastoral Committee reported on its visiting work with some of our more frail and isolated church members - work carried out by volunteers from the congregation. lt also noted with appreciation and thanks the work of Dr Jim Jenkinson, who was standing down as the bereavement visitor and who delivered flowers and followed up with visits to those who have recently had a bereavement. The Kirk Session echoed these sentiments warmly.

The Outreach Committee advised the Kirk Session of the considerable amount of work they did to support fundraising for our three charities, the Edinburgh Clothing Store, Scottish Love in Action, and the Marie Curie Hospice at Fairmilehead. This fundraising work was often strongly supported by members of the Social Committee. The recent Beetle Drive raised over £400 for Church funds and was greatly enjoyed by people of all ages. The Speaker Suppers continue successful and the committee is looking forward to the next supper, to be held on Friday 24th February where the guest speaker will be the Lord Lyon King of Arms.

New Hall: The Session Clerk reported on the new hall development, that we now have Planning Permission from the City Council planning department, but that, because of the delay in approval being granted, work will not begin until the New Year. There has been a good showing of interest in the sale of the Cluny Centre. Some time has also been spent looking at improving the sound systems in the church and halls, and also considering the possibility of recording services so that they would be available visually and aurally on the church website.

The Kirk Session gave formal approval to the appointment of Jennifer Stark as our new Associate for Pastoral Care and Christian Education.

CONGREGATIONAL GIFT FOR THE MINISTER AS MODERATOR DESIGNATE

As you probably know Derek has been appointed Moderator Designate. I have been busy learning more of the details of what happens. One of the things I have learnt, which chimes with views that have already been expressed to me, is that it is customary for a congregation to make a personal gift to the Moderator on the occasion of his appointment. There are no rules as to what is given – it depends on the willingness and generosity of the congregation. However congregations often give the Moderatorial gown which it is customary for Moderators and ex Moderators to wear.

As you will appreciate the demand for Moderatorial robes is not great. They have to be custom-made and cost £1,850. This can be beyond the reach of many congregations but I hope it is something to which we might aspire.

You may think it early days to raise this matter, but I understand from the Session Clerk of Cramond that they presented Russell Barr with his robes but having placed the order in December, they were

ready only 10 days before they were needed. Time is therefore of the essence. This not a subject which Derek has raised and indeed I think he would be embarrassed to do so. However he has very graciously indicated that he acknowledges that his character as a minister has been moulded by the congregations he has served and that he has accepted the role not just for himself but in honour of his congregations. I think it would therefore be appropriate to honour the tradition of a congregational gift, so that when he dons moderatorial garb he will have literally a tangible token of the support of the congregation round him. If you would like to contribute please place your donation in the envelopes available in the pews marked "Moderatorial Gift" or indeed in any envelope clearly so marked and place in the collection bag on Sunday or hand it in or send to the office. It would be helpful if donations could be received by 6th December. I hope I can count on your support.

ASSOCIATE FOR CHRISTIAN EDUCATION AND PASTORAL CARE

My name is Jennifer Stark and as I write this, I've just finished my third week with you in Morningside Parish Church – a very short time, but I feel already at home, and as if I have been here much longer!

A little about me. I was actually born not far from Edinburgh, in Polmont, but my parents came from north of Glasgow, and I grew up in Stirling. I studied history at St Andrews, and carried away many vivid memories of music-making and Easter travels with an eccentric but very talented choir! I spent some years

abroad, teaching English in Finland, France, Jordan and Indonesia – a wonderful experience which taught me much about the rest of the world and brought many good friends – and lived also for a number of years in York.

My faith journey began with baptism and childhood in the Church of Scotland, but I've been much enriched by experience of different traditions along the way – Lutheran, Anglican, Catholic and Quaker, to mention a few – and the friendships formed, for example, in an Ecumenical Theology course in York. This led in turn to sharing our tastes in single malt whisky, and climbing trips to Skye, Wales and the Lake District! But it also inspired me to explore my faith further by studying for an MA in theology from Leeds University; and by various degrees, to work for the Church of Scotland, first in Leith as leader of an ecumenical outreach project (where my work with the port chaplains opened up a whole new dimension of ministry to me); and then as part of a cross-parish ministry team in Glenrothes, focusing on children and families work and pastoral/ congregational support.

Thanks so much to you all for the welcome and support as I have gradually found my way around and started putting names to faces! I am already greatly enjoying my work with the Sunday Club, congregation and baby/toddler groups, and look forward to the months ahead.

As if they had a room.


We don't want folk
