One of the most impressive things at the General Assembly is the Communion service on the Monday morning when around 1,000 people share the bread and the wine at a special service. The tradition in the Church of Scotland was to have wine served in 'common' cups, which were passed from communicant to communicant. This is how the communion is served at the General Assembly. In the C19th, largely through the Free Church, the practice of individual cups was introduced. It was thought to combat the spreading of disease. This introduction is something I personally regret and believe that you're more likely to 'catch something' from touching a door handle than sipping from a silver cup containing port. I appreciate, however, that not everyone shares this view. For those who would like to share the common cup at our 10.30am communion service, the pews at the back of the church on the right hand side of the nave (the south side) is the place to be. If you have never had the common cup before, or would like to experience it, I would strongly encourage you to do try this and share the wine element of communion

in a style more akin. to what Jesus did when He instituted the Lord's Supper shared common cup with His disciples.




A Moderator's Year: Friday 7th September 7.30pm

A GIFT TO THE CHURCH IN YOUR WILL

The work of Morningside Parish Church has been assisted greatly by many generous gifts in the Wills of members of the congregation and adherents.

Please remember that a gift to the Church in your Will is exempt from Inheritance Tax as the Church is a recognised registered charity.

If you have already made a Will. If you have already made a Will, but would like to leave a gift to the Morningside Parish Church, you can do so by making a simple addition to your existing Will. This is called a codicil. By adding this supplement to your Will you can include new instructions and delete old ones without having to go through the task of revoking the whole Will.

If you have not already made a Will. If you do not have a Will at the moment, you may need to see a solicitor who will give sound professional advice and ensure that your wishes are achieved.

An important part of our funding comes as a result of gifts left in people's Wills. These are key

to supplementing the regular giving and allow us to carry out the on-going work of our congregation.

These gifts play a huge role in our work within the community and maintaining and upkeep of the fabric of Morningside Parish Church. A recent example of this was a generous legacy from a member of the Congregation which enabled us to completely refurbish our beautiful Father Willis organ and, even more recently, Miss Mary Cowan's legacy for the St Andrew room ceiling.

Please don't think the gift that you may leave has to be large – every gift makes a valuable contribution to the ongoing life of Morningside Parish Church. For example, this is reflected by the income generated from the investment of legacies received over past years.

What better way to say thank you for the support, personal memories and enjoyment over the years than to allow our members in the future to share them?

MINISTRIES & MISSION CONTRIBUTION FOR 2018

A letter of thanks has been received from the Deputy Treasurer of the Church of Scotland. In his letter he thanks us for the contributions we have made in the past to support the worship, mission and service of the Church through the money given in our offerings. He also explains how the contribution of £127,611 which we are asked to make in 2018 will be used.

The largest share (83.5%) amounting to £106,555 will go towards the cost of providing over 750 ministers and parish workers in communities throughout Scotland, including the stipend, employer's national insurance and pension contributions of our own minister. In 2018 the cost of a parish minister at the top of the stipend scale is £42,362, so although we benefit as a congregation by the costs of our own minister being met from this

fund, a good percentage (c60%) of our contribution to Ministries goes towards providing funds to support congregations who cannot afford the full cost of providing a minister.

The balance of our contribution (16.5%) amounting to £21,056 goes towards a wide variety of work funded centrally including resourcing congregations for Christian education and outreach; providing through Crossreach social care services to people in need; the work of the World Mission and Church and Society Councils: providing day to day service work in administrative, financial and legal matters; and in planning the General Assembly and the work of the Moderator in his/her period as Moderator.

As you see our contribution helps ensure a very diverse ministry is maintained in many ways and many places.

MUSICAL NOTES

Have you missed the Choir over the summer months? I hope so! But it is good for all of us in the chancel - including the Organist! - to have a rest for a while, from which we return (we hope) refreshed and ready to begin again.


However, none of us gets any younger, and any new recruits from the Congregation or indeed outwith it (provided they pass a simple audition), would be made most welcome. As for Choral Scholars, on whom we rely more and more, at the time of writing we have signed up 2 Sopranos, and 1 Bass-baritone, and I hear a potential Alto/Soprano this coming Thursday; but we still look for another Alto/Soprano, and - of course - a Tenor. (We are delighted to welcome back Alasdair Grant as our Organ Scholar, after his year of study in Germany.) So if you know of anyone who is a potential choir member - scholar or "lay" (as it were) - do give them a nudge and put them in touch with me.

The maintenance of a reasonable standard of choral music is of great importance to me - as I hope it is to many, if not

all, of you. But we can only keep going in any worthwhile way with the arrival from time to time of new members. And these get more and more difficult to find - even potential Choral Scholars are not that easy to come by, now that every other church in the city seems to be offering something along these lines. So, do think about what I write above. This is not a problem unique to Morningside, of course: a friend who sings in another parish church choir in the city tells me that he is their latest "new member" - and he (re-)joined that church, upon returning home to Edinburgh, over ten years ago! But please, if at all possible, do not let us allow MPC to join the ever-growing list of churches where a choir is but a distant memory, and the musical part of the service is reduced to merely organ voluntaries and five hymns... M.W

SOUTH EAST EDINBURGH FOODBANK

In the twelve months from April 2017 to April 2018, members of the congregation donated 267kg of food to the SE Edinburgh Foodbank, based at Southhouse Broadway. Some 1.2 million three day emergency food parcels were issued to people in the UK in 2017 by Foodbanks run by the Trussell



Trust, of which that at Southhouse is one, so your donations are hugely important and greatly appreciated.

Partner agencies, which include health visitors, schools and social work departments, identify people in crisis and issue them with a foodbank voucher, which enables the recipients to collect a three day food parcel from their local foodbank. Reasons for referral include debt, benefit delays, domestic abuse and redundancy. Each parcel contains non-perishable items such as tinned soup, tomatoes, beans and rice pudding, tea or coffee, pasta, long-life milk, rice, jam, cereal, meat, fish, biscuits and treats such as sweets and chocolate.

Thank you to everyone who has contributed over the last year. Donations may be placed in the container situated beneath the pigeon-holes in the corridor between the church halls.

THE FRIENDS OF MORNINGSIDE PARISH CHURCH

Over the past few years the Friends of Morningside Parish Church have been active in undertaking a number of projects which have helped with the enhancement of the church's beautiful features and in raising awareness of the building's valuable heritage.

In the year ended 31st December 2017 the Friends raised some £4,000 in income from membership donations and Gift Aid recoveries from HMRC.

In that twelve month period, the Friends spent almost £29,000 on a number of projects, namely:

A contribution of £4,500 was made to support the costs of the choral and organ scholars. This annual support has been ongoing for many years.

£24,500 was paid for projects involving the architectural lighting of the chancel, subsiding floodlighting running costs and improving external stair lighting in the church grounds.

Given that these payments exceeded the Friends annual income, a planned deficit of £25,000 resulted which reduced funds in the Friends bank account to £28,000 at 31 December 2017.

At the Friends AGM in May this year, the members approved a contribution of £2,000 towards new landscaping works in the church grounds.

Consideration will also be given to supporting the choral and organ scholars again in 2018 and assisting a church project to install new LED floodlighting in the grounds.

You can see that the Friends are very active in carrying out a wide range of valuable projects to further enhance the beauty of the church. We would like to do more. However, an increase in our current membership is vital if we are going to retain the capacity to continue our valuable work in the longer term. Please join us. The first step is to contact our Treasurer, Bob Cunningham, to obtain a membership application. Your help and future support would be greatly appreciated.
