Dear Friends

Last Christmas I did not preach on Christmas Day, the first time I hadn't done that in over thirty years. Instead, after attending a service, I went

with one of my chaplains to help at Crisis for Christmas. on Southside. It was one of the most moving events of my year, and a privilege to be involved. The charity provides not only hot food and drinks for homeless people, but also hair-dressing, medical checks, dental checks, clothing, opportunity to play games, or to sleep somewhere safe during the day time. This year there might even be a vet brought in to look after some of the pets homeless people sometimes have with them.

Homelessness is not only confined to those who sleep rough. There are many others who have temporary accommodation, but who have to leave their shelters at around 8 in the morning, and can't return until around 8 at night.

I found the whole experience moving and upsetting beyond words.

I had no particular skills to bring to the shelter, but I could listen, so I found myself listening to person after person, hearing stories of drug and alcohol abuse; hearing stories of being abused as a child; hearing stories of relationships breaking down; hearing stories of serial unemployment. Most chilling of all was hearing

from a number of the people on Christmas Day, women and men, who felt they were invisible. "Nobody sees us, nobody hears us", one 83

year old man told me.

There is no time of the year when this is a good thing, but particularly at this time of the year, the echoes of the homeless Saviour of the World being born in a stable were almost unbearable.

Christmas has its challenges, and families not usually spending so much time together is a mixed blessing, but we should more than spare a thought for those who will

spend much of this time of year on their own, and not by choice. Some of you might be in a position to do something about this, not forcing festivity on everyone, but leaving intentional invitations open. Some enjoy their own company at this time of the year, and that is good. But others find not only Christmas Day itself, but the days around it empty and bare, when 'normal' life is suspended.

The point of Christmas, and the Incarnation, is that God is with us, in Jesus. God is present. For those who might appreciate it, how might you be present for them over this coming Christmas and New Year? A few minutes of your time, doing the Christ-like thing. Now there would be a real gift.

KIRK SESSION NEWS

At its November meeting, Session heard reports from:-

Outreach Committee: the committee reported on plans for the Edinburgh Clothing Store Christmas clothing drive, which was launched on 18th November. The committee continues to raise money through a variety of events for church charities, and also supports the Sunday morning coffees where monies are raised towards church funds.

Pastoral Committee: The Kirk Session heard about the work of the Pastoral Committee. There are currently nine church visitors visiting nine members of the congregation, with the committee continuing to keep the situation under review. At a recent meeting our new pastoral assistant introduced herself and shared some of her ideas and plans with the committee. The committee will be involved in supporting the forthcoming 'Blue Christmas' service on 16th December at 3pm in the Church. Single roses will be handed out to all who attend the service, and there will be refreshments afterwards.

Local Church Review. The Kirk Session discussed and approved the Local Church Review that will be submitted to a visiting team from Presbytery. The review has three parts one deals with congregational statistics; the second part looks at 'Where are we now' and encourages congregations to review what is currently happening in worship, discipleship, service, evangelism and fellowship. Healthy churches keep a balance between these five purposes, but how churches do these things varies enormously. The final part of the review looks at next steps for the congregation. What do we hope to do, why are these the right steps ahead; how will we take those steps, and when will we take them? Work has been identified in the area of children of families within the congregation, and also around the forthcoming work of our pastoral assistant. A training programme for pastoral visitors, elders and

others will be held. Particular thought is going to be given to the needs of those with dementia and their families, both within the congregation and the wider parish. Finance is going to be particularly challenging over the next few years as we adapt to being on one building site, with all the challenges and opportunities that this brings. Issues relating to relatively low giving by some members within the congregation will need to be addressed.


