Dear Friends

You need a sense of humour at the moment. We don't know what's going to happen next. We don't know what we can rely on. And we don't know if we will get the 2022 we want. Someone said to me that this feels like the third attempt at 2020!

In truth, we never know what's going to happen next. The idea that life was predictable before the pandemic is a fantasy derived from dealing with perpetual uncertainty. All of us know unexpected diagnoses, disastrous turns of events, surprising opportunities: it's the stuff of life. The difference is, we're back in a period where it's an everyday occurrence for all of us. It's tiring, sometimes discouraging. But the real value of life emerges at least as much in adversity as in comfort.

Meanwhile most of us know what it feels like to discover a relationship, a long-term plan, a firmly held conviction, a job, isn't as secure as we thought it was.

Times like these make us separate out the things we really can rely on from the things

that aren't as locked-down as we thought they were. And that's a good thing to be clear about.

One thing I've learned beyond doubt in the last two years is that there's a huge number of people – far more than I'd imagined – who care about Morningside Parish Church as

much as I do. They've given and not counted the cost, they've fought and not heeded the wounds, they've laboured and not sought for rest. It's been the most inspiring experience – not to feel alone, but to realise how deeply so many people care about this community and all it stands for. And that's the heart of our faith.

Faith is God saying, 'I care about this as much as you do. I care about this world, this universe, your life as much as you do. And I'm going to be with you now, still, always.'

I want to thank you for the loyalty, long-suffering and love you've shown these last two years. You've shown me the wonder of what it means to be Christian. You've shown me the heart of God.

INTRODUCING JAMIE SUTHERLAND

I am delighted to be joining the congregation at Morningside Parish Church as an enquirer for Ministry in the Church of Scotland. Although I am now local to the Morningside area, I am originally from Inverness where I grew up in the small rural parish of Croy & Dalcross. I moved to Edinburgh in 2011 to attend University. My home congregation is Greyfriars Kirk where I have been a member for four years. I have served as an elder at Greyfriars since March 2020, where I was ordained in a surreally near-normal service just before the announcement of the Covid-19 lockdown. As an elder, I have been particularly focused on discussions about the future of the Church of Scotland and how to re-imagine ministry and mission for a contemporary Scottish context. I represented Greyfriars in the Presbytery of Edinburgh Cluster Group discussions, working with our neighbouring congregations to identify our vision for future mission in the Edinburgh City Centre.

The period of discernment for me is the opportunity to challenge my call to serve God, to identify my skills and talents, and to discern how He might be asking me to serve. Embarking on this process naturally involves a mixture of excitement and anxiety, just as we see both hope and worry about our future as the Church of Scotland. However, I believe that if we are to adapt to our new



circumstances in a rapidly changing world, we must reflect deeply on Jesus's words in Matthew 6:27 where he asks, "can any of you by worrying add a single hour to your span of life?". This can only be achieved by looking beyond the institutions of The Kirk to focus directly on our fundamental calling; making Christ known by proclaiming the Gospel and transforming fractured lives through bold Christian action. I hope that being an enquirer will provide me with the opportunity to identify just how and where I can contribute to this, and to share experience with those who are already doing this in different places. Wherever my period of discernment takes me, I am excited to learn from the experience of mission and community in Morningside and to join with you in life and worship over the coming months.

DECEMBER KIRK SESSION

From its Zoom meeting in December:

Presbytery Reform: - The Moderator reported that, at the Presbytery meeting on 7 December, the Presbytery Planning Strategy Team (PPST) stated that it planned to issue the following day a report on the basis of its proposals.

The General Assembly 2021 agreed on a 40% reduction in ministry posts across the Church of Scotland. In the Presbytery of Edinburgh this means a reduction from 78 to 48.5. The Consultation Document is an introduction to the principles on which the PPST bases its decisions and is presented "in order to begin in depth conversations about city wide mission."

The proposals in essence will establish seven groups of congregations, to be known as "Mission Districts". The proposals will include a "Mission Narrative" for each Mission District and each Mission District will be required to work out from "grass root" discussion how they envisage their group will be able to achieve their mission objectives from their allocation of resources. Their responses will require to be considered at a Presbytery consultation on Saturday 15 January 2022. This will be a consultation meeting only at which "no decisions will be made".

At this stage, no proposals are being offered regarding church buildings and halls. The General Trustees are required to make an objective assessment of the condition and location of congregational buildings.

The Approved Mission Plan is required to be in place by 31 December 2022.

The Consultation Document includes –

Mission is to be at the heart of all we do - based on -

The 5 Marks of Mission – (1) to proclaim the Good News; (2) to teach, baptise and nurture new believers; (3) to respond to human need by loving service; (4) to seek to transform unjust structures of society, to challenge violence of every kind and pursue peace and reconciliation; (5) to strive to safeguard the integrity of creation and sustain and renew the life of the earth.

The Secondary Principles - (1) Each community will be served by a parish; (2) we will work Ecumenically; (3) we will have priority for the Poor; (4) the Whole People of God will be encouraged and called out to exercise their gifts; (5) there will be worshiping, witnessing and serving congregations within easy access of everyone in Edinburgh; (6) a mixed economy of existing Church structures and New Expressions of Faith will be encouraged; (7) each congregation must be financially viable and realistic; (8) buildings must be “well equipped spaces in the right places”.

Parishes & Mission Districts – “Congregations can no longer act in isolation but will work together, sharing resources and encouraging and supporting each other particularly where a disparity of wealth, resources and gifts exist.”

Parishes and Ecumenical working – it is expected that each Mission District will work ecumenically and collegially with other denominations for the good of the Kingdom.

Diversity of Posts – 48.5 posts will be nationally funded; some congregations can and do fund local posts; the Finance Committee is proposing to release funds from existing Mission Funds to fund up to two additional posts for the period of the plan.

New Missional Opportunities - a few congregations are being asked to plant new ecclesial communities in large housing developments being built on the edge of the city and others may wish to offer support.

Finance – the challenge is to ensure that pruning does not reduce the substantial contribution that Edinburgh makes to the wider work of the church. It is recognised that closing too many buildings leads to a reduction of membership and income. It is an expectation that the congregation exercise financial responsibility and each congregation must be financially viable and realistic.

Buildings - the nationally accepted wisdom is that there are too many buildings. However, the Mission Plan proposes that where there is a clear mission imperative, most buildings will be retained in some manner. The buildings which best serve the Church and the community will be “well equipped places in the right places”. Some buildings will require to be released.

Post Covid - there may be a call for new ways of engaging online with the city.

West Lothian – it is planned to work to identify the best ways to serve the new housing developments which are being built along the boundaries of both former Presbyteries.

Reviewable Charges and Tenure – implementation of the plan will mean some Reviewable Charges will of necessity be reviewed but there are also proposals which will affect ministers on Full Tenure.

Conclusion – For new parishes to be planted, some over-churched areas must be thinned out so that Presbytery can plan for new growth in new areas

The proposals directly affecting our Church:

MPC will be part of a Mission District on the South of Edinburgh in three parts –

1. A Union of Gracemount, Liberton, Liberton Northfield, Tron Kirk Gilmerton, and Moredun with two ministers and one Pioneer MDS (MDS = Ministry Development Staff)
2. Union of Morningside and Reid Memorial with one minister.
3. Union of Fairmilehead, Greenbank and Colinton Mains with two ministers.

It is suggested that MPC and Reid Memorial (RM) will be served by one minister and local staff as required. “Recent refurbishment at MPC has underlined the potential of buildings used wisely for hospitality, the hosting of local groups and the forging of relationships. Lesson learnt from this process, shared with the congregation of RM, can point the way to the best missional use of RM’s buildings. The sale of RM’s manse can provide funds to undertake this or related missional initiatives guided by good organisation and governance.”

Reports - Stewardship & Finance – Chris McNeil, Treasurer reported that - he had received intimation of a legacy % of residue estimated as being around £5,000.

- the **financial outcome for 2021** was likely to produce a deficit of c£28k, a substantial reduction on the budgeted deficit. He suggested that the outcome can be attributed to the fact that congregational income had held up well and had benefitted from £5,300 donated on the National Giving Day (which would not be included in calculations for Ministry & Mission), £5,000 donated by the Friends of MPC to partially fund the choral scholars, £11,500 from legacies and £17,945 from receipts from Furlough payments.

The Treasurer had circulated a **detailed draft budget for 2022** with annotations explaining the entries. **Total income is** estimated to be £248,521 (2021 estimated to be £211,521). He drew attention to the increased budget from letting of £36k (2021 - £14,815) which had been severely affected by lockdown). It is hoped that letting will not be significantly affected by the impact of the new Covid variant. The income is also boosted by the Tor Grant of £10,980 for the Morningside Hope Project.

Expenditure was anticipated to be £316,521 (2021 - £270,100). He highlighted the principal variances as being a reduction of the contribution to the Ministries and Mission Fund from an anticipated £113,000 as a result of an application of funds by Presbytery to reduce it to £102,843; the increase in staff salaries to £101,321 (2021 - £85,732). Overall, the anticipated deficit is estimated as £68k (2021 - £58,806).

Session approved the budget and authorised the Treasurer to apply for funds held for MPC at 121 to cover the deficit and as necessary to facilitate cash flow.

Session recorded its thanks to the Treasurer and the Stewardship & Finance Committee for the production of the budget and indeed for their oversight of the church’s financial affairs throughout the year.

Local Hero’s Award - the Moderator reported that our Church had been presented by our local MP Ian Murray with this award made to an individual or organisation for their work in the community. He thanked Ian Murray, on behalf of the congregation, for the award and the congregation for the contribution they had made to achieving it. He planned to have it displayed in the entrance hall where it would be visible to the many users of our halls.

Sound financial planning

Leaving a charitable gift in your Will is an astute means of tax planning for you and your family.

Inheritance Tax (IHT) is currently at 40%. If your estate is over a certain threshold, £0.40 of every £1 could potentially be 'lost' in tax. However a legacy to a charity is automatically free of IHT. This could take the form of money, shares, a work of art, land or simply what remains when all gifts have been made.

If you leave 10% or more of your net estate to a charity, IHT overall is reduced to 36%. That means family may face a substantially smaller tax liability.
