Dear Friends

As I write, I am preparing for the General Assembly. The 'Blue Book', the reports for the Assembly debates, has made particularly grim reading this year. The national church has been warning for years that the time for change, adaptation and renewal in the Church has been with us, well, forever. From its inception in 1560 the Church of Scotland has had to struggle hard to establish its place within the country, whether against vested interests, or general indifference as prevalent in the C18th, for example, as today.

In our own congregation we know that things may be ticking over, but the next ten or twenty years will be critical, for us as for every congregation in the country. People have looked to apportion blame, rarely helpful, or to expect salvation from other bodies. "Can't Presbytery/General Assembly/121 do something?" The fact that Presbytery and the

General Assembly are overwhelmingly made up of ordinary ministers, deacons and elders from ordinary congregations suggests that they, like the rest of us, wrestle with the same issues. The Church of Scotland offices at 121 George Street have also seen a drastic reduction in numbers in recent years.

At a recent meeting with our neighbours at Greenbank, Fairmilehead and St John's

Colinton Mains I learned that they, like we, have not exactly been idle. Evident in all four churches are areas of excellence, hard work and imagination, and we will be looking for ways to blend, share and encourage these as we grow in working together.

The unanswered cry is 'Where are the young people'? Lockdown eased away further some of our young families, but the decline has been evident for decades. I talk to grandparents who don't know why their

children and grandchildren don't attend (excepting Christmas). I talk to some of our young families where in this area I find that the demands of school and extracurricular activities at weekends and week-nights means that the Church has been consistently squeezed out. One parent, not a church member, told me some months ago that after the rigours of lockdown and all that was

'lost', young people were to be focussed on making up for lost time and experience, and every opportunity schools offered was to be seized and made the most of in this catch-up time, especially when school fees were involved.

There are no easy answers to these questions. If there were, we'd have found them. It's not simply about changing the music



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at church (I know as many young people repelled by rock/modern music as attracted by it!), nor times of services, nor what people wear. Into this mix we must realise that our business is not simply about attracting the young, but also about honouring the needs of the more mature members of churches whose generosity finances what we currently do.

I think answers are to be found in addressing relevance. The work that churches do in tackling food poverty (through supporting foodbanks) is the highest church-community activity across the country. Highlighting ecological issues; addressing inequalities at

home and abroad; perhaps above all others the need to provide a sense of community and belonging. These are things we need to address and re-address. And not to be ashamed of or embarrassed about our faith in Jesus, and why that makes a difference to us.

It is easy to be critical, and to ask questions, but how and where will we find the answers? I suspect nobody else is going to do it for us.

So, thinking on these things over the summer months, what are **we** going to do?

2023 SUMMER WORSHIP THEME - FOUR FILMS

Last summer, while our Minister was enjoying a well-deserved summer break, I led worship on four consecutive Sundays which followed a theme based on four Scottish novels. This summer I will again lead worship on four consecutive Sundays and will take the theme of four distinctive films. Each Sunday I will share the plot of the film, talk of its bearing on the Bible reading for that day, and consider the theological implications of both. I think the four films raise questions about prayer.

Theme: Is it selfish to pray to God?

August 6 "Babel" * Director: Alejandro Iñárritu

Starring: Brad Pitt, Cate Blanchett

Luke 12. 32-40; Hebrews 11. 1-3, 8-16

Theme: Is it better to pray to God or to listen to God?

August 13 "Falling Down" Director: Joel Schumacher

Starring: Michael Douglas, Robert Duvall Luke 12. 49-56; Hebrews 11. 29 – 12.2

Theme: Is it ethical to pray for a better life?



AUTUMN LECTURES 2023

THE WEEKEND OF 22 – 24 SEPTEMBER

We are planning a very full and hopefully entertaining weekend in September to coincide with our harvest celebrations. On Friday 22 September an **Art Exhibition** of some of the wonderful artwork that our dementia Heart for Art Group has produced, will be erected within the sanctuary, along the same layout used to display our Christmas Tree Festival. That afternoon our Music and Memories group will meet and get a chance not just to sing and chat but to have a sneak preview of the exhibition.

Our Church will be open on the morning of Saturday 23 September from 10am – 12.30pm as part of the **Edinburgh Doors Open Day** event. The Minister will conduct a tour around the sanctuary of the Church, but the main opportunity will be for people to come and visit our beautiful Church and get a closer look at many of the outstanding features in the building, as well as the Heart for Art exhibition. Entrance is free - do let friends and family know.

On the Saturday afternoon at 2pm our **Dementia-friendly Concert** will happen, starring the wonderful String Quartet who so ably entertained us last year. This will be followed by refreshments in the St Matthew Hall. From 3 – 5pm on that same Saturday, the Art Exhibition will be open to all to view and admire. The hope would be to leave the artwork up until the following Tuesday to enable as many people as possible to view it.

MAY KIRK SESSION

From its meeting in May:

Presbytery Reform - Approval of Presbytery Plan - The Clerk as Presbytery Elder had circulated a report of the Presbytery meeting on 25 April, a relatively short one disposing of much routine but necessary business. The main item of business related to the Presbytery Plan - earlier that day, the Faith Nurture Forum had at last confirmed its approval of the Presbytery Mission Plan subject to some further amendments. However, for our own area, there was **no change to the amendments originally proposed** i.e. that approval was given subject to the condition that "by the date of the first annual review Presbytery is required to set out in as much detail as possible, when and how it proposes to adjust the charges of Morningside, Fairmilehead, Greenbank and St John's Colinton Mains."

A vote was taken at Presbytery and approval given to the adoption of the plan subject to the further additional amendments required by Faith Nurture Forum. However, there is a period of 14 days (closing on Wednesday 10 May 2023) during which any twelve or more Presbyters, or any Kirk Session within the Presbytery, can seek a review of the process used by Presbytery in the preparation and approving of the Mission Plan by sending intimation of this to the Principal Clerk.

The Moderator reminded Session that there could still be changes overall and all plans will be subject to annual review - for our Presbytery this was likely to be April 2024 - one year after initial approval of the plan. Some congregations have been able to progress discussions on implementation as their future had been indicated many months ago. Proposals for the three charges with which we are linked were only finally proposed relatively recently. However, a further meeting had been held with the Ministers and Session Clerks of the four churches designated to work together, along with two representatives from Presbytery's Deployment of Resources committee and a facilitator. As a first stage, each congregation had produced two papers, one indicating what they do in different areas of church life and one highlighting a year's diary of events. These papers had been circulated and the latest meeting had very much been taken up with a presentation by each congregation's representatives amplifying these papers. Clearly much good work is being carried out but the major question is whether there are unnecessary overlaps and whether by working together something greater could be achieved. It was agreed that it was important the respective Sessions should become involved in determining an appropriate way forward but it was necessary first to get to know each other better. Shared events and projects might assist – joint services or perhaps some new joint project could be worth considering as it would be free of any history relating to a single congregation.

In response to a question from Doreen Reekie, it was noted that there had yet to be a discussion of the financial position of each congregation. Robert Armour serves on Presbytery's Deployment Committee and advised that the original concept had been a union of the three other churches with MPC joining at a later date. However, the Clerk reported that this had not been presented or discussed at the meetings and the focus had very much been on seeking an arrangement for all four churches from the outset. Session was invited to consider and suggest to the Moderator or the Clerk possible ideas for joint activities.

Health & Safety Report - Moira Clark Convenor reported that -

Fire Drills - The caretakers have started carrying out and recording fire drills for building users again, so be prepared for there to be surprise drills when attending meetings etc

Staff health and safety refresher training has not taken place in the last year or so and this will be addressed in the coming months, including what should be covered, who should deliver etc.

Risk assessments are in place covering tasks that we expect our caretakers to carry out, and these will be reviewed in the coming months to ensure they are relevant and complete. Alongside these, the Health and Safety plan and Fire Plan will also be reviewed.

The annual walk round of the building will be completed over the summer months to address H&S and Fire Safety issues. If anyone has spotted anything in the meantime or has any thoughts, please do let Moira know. As ever, health and safety concerns all of us.

Communication Committee - Issie Paterson, Convenor reported -

Christmas Tree Festival – Last year's Festival seemed to bring festive cheer so we hope to repeat it this year. The dates allow the trees to be up for two weekends. Set up would be week beginning 4 December – date yet to be determined. Take down has to be after the service on 17 December to allow for movement of chairs for the various events that follow. The following has been decided –

- Viewing will be daily 10am 2pm: shorter than last year but we will need stewarding for longer.
- The Social Committee have agreed to serve coffee on the two Saturdays 10-12.
- We will ask the three churches with which we are forming a closer relationship to decorate a tree.
- We are hopeful that Wm. Purves will sponsor us as they did last year.
- Rona McLaren's craft stall, contributed to by a large number of the congregation, proved both popular and profitable last year. She is happy to repeat her efforts this year.

To give participants adequate time to plan, a meeting is to be held on Wednesday 21 June to discuss details. Anyone who would like to help is invited to attend.

Communication within the congregation – We discussed how we might improve our communication within the congregation but concluded that our Minister, Pastoral Assistant and elders were doing a good job. Sunday coffee and flower deliveries provide additional opportunities.

Paper or digital communication by emails, magazine and intimations could be repetitive but that may help to reinforce the message. Christmas cards to the congregation seem to be appreciated.

Communication outwith the congregation - We had evidence that the live streaming is watched very widely: a couple from Cornwall on holiday here introduced themselves as appreciative viewers. We hesitate to claim that it brought them to Edinburgh, but when here they were pleased to introduce themselves and voice their appreciation.

Banners continue to advertise events effectively but we agreed to look at the one for the Summer musical events to check that it was sufficiently generic and adequately smart.

On Facebook, the church's page is very active & the 'I Love Morningside' page useful.

The Jam, Baking and Making Stall continues to involve a wide range of people who raise a useful amount of money for church funds.

Review of the Roll – Fiona Stewart advised that since the last Session there have been six deaths, and the Roll now stands at 348.

Following the Roll Review and chiming with the review of means of communicating with Church members, the group considered whether there continued to be a need to email or post out quarterly Communion Invitations. As the dates of Communion are widely advertised via the magazine (hard copy or online), weekly email, website and in the Order of Service Intimations, it was agreed that sending out Invitations should now stop.

Appointment of Presbytery Elder - The Moderator proposed and Session agreed to Robin Stimpson serving another year as Presbytery Elder. He reminded Session that Robert Armour also served on Presbytery as an Equalising Elder.




