Dear Friends

On Sunday 23 April at 3pm (and I am writing this a little in advance of the event), there is to be a national test of the UK Emergency Alerts system. It is a UK Government service to warn us if there is a danger to life nearby. Mobile phones and tablets (computer-based, not those purchased from the chemist!) will receive an alert with advice about how to stay safe. Rather ominously, for some, we learn that 'The Government does not need to know your phone number or location to send you an alert.' You will only get alerts dependent on your current location, not where you live or work unless that is where your device is.

The point of the Emergency Alerts is to warn if there are dangers like severe flooding, fire, or extreme weather. I was reminded of the old Cold War nuclear alerts from the 60s and 70s, when I was at school, when an alarm was sounded and we all had to hide under our desks. Not dissimilar to the

safety precautions urged in Britain during World War Two when hiding under staircases or tables was also encouraged during bombing raids.

What are the things in life about which we need to be warned? How good are we at listening to warnings? Where do we go for safety or protection today? In a world where we have been taught to be self-reliant, and where most still are uneasy about being beholden to anyone for anything, these old questions have modern twists. How often is

our natural inclination to say, 'No, I'll manage', or 'No, I don't need any help', or the worst of all, 'I'm fine', when the exact opposite is very often the case. Of course, we must play our part in shouldering responsibility, not just for ourselves, and sometimes for others, but there are times when we aren't going to make it on our own, and we need that extra bravery, which is not weakness or admitting defeat, to say, 'could you give me a hand', or, hardest of all, 'I need help.'

We may well believe that God helps those who help themselves, but that is not to say

that God will not step in to help us until we ask; or others won't step in to help us unless we ask; or we won't step in to help others unless they ask. It's a tough call, but very often the help is there if we need it or, at the very least, we call attention to the problem, or the alert, or the issue, and if it can, help will come, or we travel alongside others as we support each other.

The Psalmist writes: "I lift up my eyes to the hills. From whence does my help come? My help comes from the Lord, Who made heaven and earth." We won't always need the reminder of a national Emergency Alert. Help is often there, for any of us, for all of us, when we have the courage and humility to ask for it. But help can also be offered to those around us, when we see or hear, or do not see or hear, the needs of others.

APRIL KIRK SESSION

From its meeting in April:

Presbytery Mission Planning: On 9 March 2023, representatives of Fairmilehead, Greenbank, Morningside and St. John's Colinton Mains churches met Keith Graham and Stewart Weaver from the Deployment Group of Edinburgh and West Lothian Presbytery, which is responsible for the creation and implementation of the Presbytery Mission Plan. There was an external facilitator, Richard Lloyd. The meeting was a first step in addressing the requirement of the Presbytery Plan for the four churches to work together, with the final form of collaboration still to be determined. The Plan requires a specific framework to be agreed by the first annual review of the Mission Plan which will be in a bit over a year from now. The framework needs to demonstrate that each of the four congregations is formally part of the new collaboration. The new partnership will be served by three full time Ministers.

The meeting recognised the importance of getting to know each other better. This might include some visits to the other churches and grass root exchanges between organisations. There was specific agreement to exchange information about activities that each church was involved in; and to swap calendars of events planned over the next year.

It was agreed that a short note would be sent out to congregations from each meeting.

The next meeting will be at Greenbank Church on 27 April.

Report from Staff Committee – The Clerk was happy to report that Leigh Malaihollo who had been working in the office as a temp had, after the interviews of a short leet of applicants, been chosen by the Committee to become our new Administrator. She officially started her appointment on 3 April 2023.

Review of the Roll – Fiona Stewart had advised that there had been no changes since Session last met and the Roll still stood at 354. The draft proposals for the revised Districts had been circulated.

She pointed out that changes to the Districts were inevitable following the retiral of 12 District Elders. Although two of the new Elders have volunteered to take on a District, there were still significant gaps to fill. Also, whilst some Elders will have more people to visit, Session has previously agreed that one visit per year (rather than routinely every quarter as at present) is the minimum requirement, though there is certainly no problem if a District Elder wishes to visit more frequently. We also discovered that phone call 'visits' worked well during lockdown where face-to-face visits were more difficult.

She highlighted some of the main changes.

District 1: All visits to care homes will now be carried out by members of the Pastoral Care Visiting Team, led by Jacqui Lindsay and Doreen Reekie. If a District Elder wishes to continue visiting a care home resident, then, of course, they can do so, but it will now be as a member of this Visiting Team.

District 5: One of our new Elders, David Rimer, will be visiting in this District, teaming up with Walter Thomson.

District 8: it was simply not possible for every District Elder to retain their existing District and, as a result, two Elders – Lesley Murphy and Nyria Bailey- are being asked to take on a new patch. Lesley takes on District 8, Nyria, District 17.

District 15: another of our new Elders, Sally Brown, is willing to undertake visiting and will share this District with David Calder.

District 19: This is a dispersed District and, with the retiral of the two previous Elders, it has been decided that it will no longer have a visiting Elder. This District will now be merged with District 20 to create an expanded District 19, the Postal District.

Session agreed the proposals and thanked Fiona, in particular, for her thoughtful and gracious approach to the changes.

Car Rota

We are seeking a number of volunteers to help with the car rota. Some of our drivers have indicated a desire to stop and we have some passengers on a waiting list. Your help would be very much appreciated. Your commitment would be once every four/five weeks when you would collect a passenger who is unable to come to church



independently. All that is required is for you to drop them off as close to the church as possible and take them home after the service. Whether you wish to go straight home or stay on for coffee, our passengers will fit in with whatever suits you. Most passengers live close to the church and we try to make life easier by organising teams geographically to suit drivers. A rota is printed out and sent to you once every three months. If the date does not suit, you just arrange a swap with someone else in your team. So far only one new person has volunteered; another four or five volunteers would be a real help. EDINBURGH SOUTH EAST FOODBANK

In the last few months, the effects of the cost of living crisis has been all too apparent at the SE Edinburgh Foodbank. As the cost of foodstuffs has risen so the amount of donations received has fallen,

whilst the number of people being referred for food parcels has increased. In the last 4 weeks 144 parcels have been issued, supporting around 350 people, of whom 137 were children. This represents over 3,500kg of food. In the past, donations have matched the amount of food issued but that has not been the case recently as demand is now significantly exceeding donations received.

Our Harvest Thanksgiving Service in September will, once again, be supporting the Foodbank at Southhouse but, as that is still a few months away, there is a more pressing and immediate need for food stocks to be replenished. Any donations of non-perishable foodstuffs would be especially welcome at this time—rice, jam, tea, coffee, tins of meat, fish, fruit, custard, etc. We would also welcome donations of toiletries such as shower gel, shampoo and toilet rolls, as well as washing up liquid. Donations can be placed in the container beneath the pigeonholes in the Braid corridor.

MORNINGSIDE HOPE CONCERT

At the end of March, we were delighted to start our 2023 series of dementia-friendly concerts with an impressive organ recital by our Church Organist and Choir Master, Morley Whitehead, with one of our current Choral Scholars, Nasreen Lofti, providing some beautiful vocal solos. We attracted an excellent audience and hope to build on this success in our future concerts.

The programme was eclectic and wellchosen with excellent commentary provided by Morley to aid the listening. Some old favourites combined



beautifully with some novel items such as Mozart's *Adagio for a Glass Harmonica* and a charming piece by Michael Christian Festing, his *Largo, Allegro and Aria* plus variations. Nasreen complemented the organ pieces with a beautiful unaccompanied rendering of the *Skye Boat Song*, with some spontaneous audience participation followed by some moving Elgar and Fauré. Morley's concluding pieces included the *Swan* from Saint-Saëns '*Carnival of the Animals*', usually heard on the cello, and as a finale, he played Boëllmann's *Toccata* from his *Suite Gothique*, or as Morley preferred to call it, 'Fungus the Bogeyman', demonstrating a rousing conclusion with full organ power!

Again, post concert refreshments and a chance to chat were greatly enjoyed by the audience and performers and grateful thanks to the amazing catering staff and the caretaker. In addition, our gratitude to all the church staff and stewards, the Minister for his welcome, Douglas Paterson for photography and the Tor Foundation for support.

Our next concert is on Saturday 27 May at 2 pm and will feature, by popular demand, a return visit by the Brass Quintet with another 'hands on' experience. This will be a real treat, don't miss it, and please encourage any brass players you know to come along, including children who will be most welcome.

THE FRIENDS OF MORNINGSIDE PARISH CHURCH

CAMOUFLAGE NETS FOR UKRAINE



Some Ukrainians alongside others are making camouflage nets in different locations in Edinburgh including Morningside, to then send them to Ukraine. The society is called Edinburgh Spiders and they have already made and sent 37 nets, some 5×5 m, others 5x10m each.

Camouflage nets are used to cover field hospitals and help save lives from enemy aviation. The Russian army is notorious for killing not only military staff but also doctors, nurses, their patients and other civilians. Camouflage nets are also used for green corridors to exchange people released from captivity and let civilians leave dangerous areas.

How can you help?

 We use old, used clothes or bedding to make the nets. We can use any old clothes, cloth, old sheets or rags/ offcuts from natural materials in shades of dry and winter stepp (olive green, grey, camel, brown, beige, white). Unfortunately, we are not able to dye bright or dark coloured fabrics

The cloth should be natural as if it catches fire, man-made materials melt and can cause serious injury. It is also helpful if the material is quite thin to make the nets lighter (not towels, blankets, jumpers or thick material, please)

- volunteer your time to weave the nets themselves
- **donate money** for the things that have to be bought (base netting) and cloth dye. Each net costs £26.
