Dear Friends

I'm in the process of preparing an official appraisal for a Presbytery office bearer. Appraisals, no matter how often they are couched in language of 'encouragement', 'observation', 'helpful to the appraisee as well as the appraiser', always smack a little of judgement, and that can make us feel uncomfortable. one of the best descriptions of what it takes to be a Christian. "Be kind."

But other words came too: honest; patient; prayerful; faithful; hopeful; loving. To be hospitable was also a description that seemed to fit the bill for being a Christian.

One of the key things in any appraisal is for both sides to assess not only the nature of the work that has been done, is being done, and is planned to be done, but also to assess the environment of the workplace, the nature of the job, the realism around expectations



Very few will be able to tick all the boxes when it comes to being Christian. There are some things we don't do, but I would suggest that there are many things that we are doing, and it may even be that some of these things we are doing well.

(on both sides) and the quality of the relationships that surround the job. I don't think anything in an appraisal should come as a complete surprise if the quality of the relationships between those around the job is open, constructive and supportive, as well as realistic.

A few weeks ago I preached on a passage from Paul's Letter to the Romans, where Paul gives a list of things Christians ought to be able to check off their list of, 'How am I being a Christian'. One of our young people gave Whether as an individual, or as a Church.

Of course, there is always room for improvement, and readjustment, and trying again. But as you read this, imagine friendly Jesus coming into the room, maybe even with a clipboard, and saying to you: "Right, let's get on with your appraisal. How are things with you? How have you been doing? What have you been doing?"

You might be surprised where the conversation takes you.

KIRK SESSION NEWS

The Kirk Session met in September:

• The **Roll Keeper, Fiona Stewart**, gave information about admitting six new members to our congregational roll.

Fiona Stimpson, Social Convener, reported that the extra dishwasher installed in the kitchen last year has made a significant difference. Teas and coffees continue to be served each Sunday except at Christmas and New Year. From this Autumn there will be two teams of men serving coffees. Teas and coffees provide an excellent way for the congregation, and visitors, to meet, and many have come into membership because of the welcome received. The Social Committee has provided food and drink for pastoral training events. It also organised a Coronation Lunch to mark the Accession of Charles III and a wide selection of treats along with Prosecco made it a memorable day. Another memorable event was the afternoon tea in August which was enjoyed by many members and friends of the congregation. It is so important that we continue to have these sociable events. Not only do they raise money for the two charities supported by the Church and the Church itself, but they provide social contact for a lot of people, vital for a happy community. The Social Committee and supporters work hard as a team to ensure the highest standards are not only met, but surpassed.

• Jacqui Lindsay, Pastoral Assistant, reported that the next Dementia Concert is on Saturday 23 September at 2pm and will feature the return, by popular demand, of the wonderful string quartet, Heart Strings. This will be part of the Harvest Weekend where the Heart for Art Exhibition will be on show from Friday to Sunday. The 15-minute film that features our Music and Memories group will also be available to watch. Our November concert will in fact be two concerts, a Musical Extravaganza of a weekend, with Rock Opera on the Saturday afternoon and a return of George Heriot's Chamber Choir on the Sunday afternoon.

Animal Afternoons: we've been delayed starting these, but the first one is on Tuesday 31 October at 2pm when we will be visited by three alpacas from our local Alpaca farm – open to all and dementia friendly.

Heritage Talk: Friday 6 October 2 – 4pm. The talk, lasting 35 – 40 minutes followed by teas and coffees, gives a chance to hear something about the development of Morningside from 1800 onwards.

Pastoral Care Training: Abbey church in North Berwick has asked us to provide level 1 and Jacqui will be running it in the second half of September. The church will be making a donation to MPC for her time. We have also been asked to provide a 3-hour taster session to Portobello and Joppa church and she will be running this on the afternoon of Sunday 15 October. Level 2 of our own pastoral care courses will run on Tuesdays 3 and 17 October and is open to anyone who has completed level 1. We will need a minimum of 8 to run this course.

Heart for Art: Currently we have 15 participants, our full cohort, and have started a waiting list. The new banner is now on our railings, and a flier has been created that can be used to further advertise this group.

• **Isobel Paterson, Communications Convener**, reported that the Jam, Baking and Making Stall having begun as a 'one off', has come to be a continuing success on the last Sunday of every month except December. It raises money for our own church's funds and involves the whole congregation in terms of serving at the stall, producing goods to sell and, of course, buying. The eight stalls so far in 2023 have raised £1,661.25.

The Christmas Tree Festival will be from Saturday 9 – Sunday 17 December, 10am – 2pm. Help will be required to set up, steward, and dismantle. The Church's charities will be the beneficiaries. Rona McLaren is in charge

of the Craft Stall – having proved her capability last year. One heart-warming benefit is the contribution to this made by some of our housebound members.

• Robert Armour, Stewardship Convener, led a discussion at the Session about a future Stewardship Campaign whose aim will be to address our deficit, and to encourage all members to review their giving positively. The startling fact remains that if each of our members increased their giving by £5 per week, the deficit would be addressed. There is a need to encourage sustainability and realism in our Church's finances. More information about the Stewardship Campaign will be forthcoming.

Convener, raised the issue of re-engaging cleaners. During and since the Covid pandemic the caretakers had taken on the task of cleaning the building. With the welcome increase in usage of the building, and with absolutely no reflection on their willingness and hard work, it has become increasingly clear that it is no longer possible for them to keep on top of the cleaning required. Moira Clark had kindly agreed to research alternative arrangements and had identified a firm who would take on the task. Subject to Session's approval, she would finalise arrangements. It is proposed that the cleaners would work on weekdays in early mornings, liaising with the caretakers when they start. The company will supply equipment and materials. It is proposed that they start with a deep clean to bring all areas up to standard and thereafter continue to maintain them to that standard. It may be that periodical further deep cleans will be desirable. The additional costs are yet to be finalised but will be in the region of £1000 per month. The caretakers will retain responsibility for dealing with any necessary interim cleaning. Session recognised that this was essentially a reinstatement of previous arrangements, thanked Moira for her work and agreed to the proposal. They also expressed

their thanks to the caretakers for taking on cleaning duties during and after the pandemic.

• Robin Stimpson, Session Clerk and Presbytery Elder, reported on the June 2023 Presbytery meeting. The June meeting covered a wide range of business including approval of a reordering of Presbytery's Committee structure and appointment of new conveners to three of the committees.

Farewells were made to ministers leaving their charges; Revd Rolf Billes from Colinton; Revd James Dewar from Juniper Green; Revd Scott Raby from Fauldhouse St Andrew's; and Revd Jack Holt from Polwarth.

Approval was also given to several unions following the approval of the Presbytery Plan. Some congregations had had an early indication of proposals affecting them and once the overall plan was approved were able to proceed quickly to implementation. Thus, approval was sought and permission given for the unions of the congregations of Cramond and The Old Kirk & Muirhouse, Meadowbank and Willowbrae; and Dalmeny and Queensferry. There is an enormous amount of work facing the Deployment Group in the year ahead. Not only are there unions to progress, but there are Reviewable Charges to review and annual reviews to be made. Their priorities will be unions, reviews of Reviewable Charges and annual reviews as stipulated by the national church.

Our neighbours at St John's Colinton Mains were granted permission to apply to the General Trustees to draw down up to £100,000 from their holding in the Consolidated Fabric Fund to pay consultants' fees for a review of the detailed design and tender documentation for major improvements to the church building. Proposals had previously been approved but permission to proceed held back until the future of the building was confirmed in the Presbytery Plan. The Plan shows SJCM as category 'A'. In the meantime, an inspection in Autumn 2022 revealed the need for a number of urgent repairs, which have now been carried out. The

cost of these, together with rising construction prices and the need for some changes to achieve listed building consent, means that the original scope of the project needs to be revisited. Improvements are, however, necessary to make SJCM a well-equipped space and they now propose to proceed with detailed design and tender documentation. SJCM would still need to revert to Presbytery for final permission to proceed with the works, following receipt of tenders.

A proposal by Linlithgow St Michael's was approved to carry out extensive repair work to their Crown of Thorns steeple at a cost then estimated at £360,569 including VAT and fees. Tenders were obtained, and the lowest was £107,734 in excess of the previously approved figure. The increase is due to a combination of recent construction cost inflation in the type of materials required, scaffolding contractors taking fright at the complex scaffolding needed, and one of the only two European manufacturers of the bronze alloy cladding buying out and closing the other, moving manufacture to Germany, and raising the price. Historic Environment Scotland has increased its grant contribution from £50,000 to £90,000 and, together with additional fundraising and support from the General Trustees, the congregation has sufficient funds to proceed on the basis of the lowest tender.

THE DEVELOPMENT OF MORNINGSIDE FROM 1800 TO 1930

If you haven't yet had a chance to hear this wonderful talk, or indeed if you would be keen to hear it again, please join us **on Friday 6 October** in the Braid Hall, 2pm. The talk itself will last approximately 35 – 40 minutes and will be followed by teas and coffees.

This fascinating illustrated talk presented by Bob Cunningham describes Morningside's development from a tiny rural village in 1800 to a modern Edinburgh suburb by 1930.

In it, he explains the factors which made Morningside such an attractive place to stay after 1800 and identifies a number of important residents who have lived there over the years.

Bob also describes how Morningside's population explosion of the later 19th century generated a vast property expansion, promoted the arrival of new sports and leisure activities and created the emergence of many new local businesses. The importance of women in Morningside society and the impact of the Great War on the local population are also covered in his talk.

FRIENDS OF MORNINGSIDE EVENT

The Friends of Morningside will be hosting a fundraising event on Tuesday 24 October at 7pm in the Church. The guest speaker will be George Anderson, TV presenter on BBC's *The Beechgrove Garden.* The theme, "How did we get to be here?" – a lifetime in horticulture.

There will be an admission charge of £10, which will go towards the funds of The Friends of Morningside.

The Friends have, since the 1990s, provided financial support for many projects around the Church. They refurbished the eagle lectern, provided


