### Dear Friends

Last month I had a few days in London and attended a starry event raising money for a statue for Benjamin Britten. In conversation at the champagne reception afterwards I was delighted to be chatting to the legendary English mezzo soprano Dame Janet Baker and said to her, slightly star-struck, "Thank you for everything." She smiled, leaned forward, and gave me a kiss, and then sniffed me. "You smell divine, what is that?" she asked. "Oh, something by Tom Ford. What's

yours?" I responded. The Dame twinkled. "I'm 90. It's formaldehyde!"

What is worth preserving in our society, and not always in formaldehyde! What are the values, principles, ideas, places, traditions and so on that are worth holding on to or adapting for some new purpose? We may think we

want to see many things remain the same and not be lost in a world where there is constant change, but one of the challenges we all face is having a belief in tradition that doesn't make us hide-bound, or clinging to the past that means we are unable to get a hold of the present or welcome the future.

When I began my ministry in 1987 there was a concern then that when the generation who had served in World War One died out, future generations would no longer see the need to

commemorate Remembrance-tide. The British Legion, and others, worked hard to ensure that all conflicts, not only two World Wars, were remembered, and that Remembrance was not to be seen as a glorification of war, but a more subtle call for the persistent need for peace. This was very much the focus in 2018 when the centenary of the ending of World War One was recalled. I have also seen across the country, and in our community, a determination not to 'preserve' the season of

Remembrance, but to embrace it and adapt it so that its message of remembering past sacrifice and working for present peace is passed on to every new generation. Not only veterans from past conflicts, who served on the front line and the home front, but younger people who look at the ongoing need for peace

with justice in all areas of our society. In the painful present with Ukraine, Israel-Palestine, Sudan and South Sudan, and other parts of the globe, this commitment to a wider peace remains poignantly necessary.

Eleanor Roosevelt once said, "It isn't enough to talk about peace. One must believe in it. And it isn't enough to believe in it. One must work at it."

### **KIRK SESSION NEWS**

The Kirk Session met in October:

Outreach Committee – Kim Milne Convener reported -

Review of Charities & Yearly Financial Commitment for 2023:

Edinburgh Clothing Store: £1,500

The PAD Project: £1,500

Morningside Parish Church: Open ended

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New Charity: Due to Covid and the lack of fundraising opportunities, the commitment to the PAD Project had been extended for another year but now it is time to take on a new charity. Kim invited Session to submit to her suggestions for the replacement of the Pad Project. She reminded Session that the usual pattern had been to have one overseas project but other more local suggestions would be welcomed for consideration by the committee. Funds held at 30.08.23 total: £844.35. The total distributions made in 2023 were £6,982.98, as follows:

The Edinburgh Clothing Store (£2,830.89);

The PAD Project (£2,830.88);

Morningside Parish Church\_(£1,321.21).

Once the Committee is in receipt of Tea & Coffee funds and the annual accounts have been finalised, a distribution will be made in respect of 2023.

WSPP PAD Project Update: -In October 2022 Marion Tasker updated Kim with the news that funds issued in 2022 meant the 'Gambia Pad Project' was set in motion, with the purchase of new material. Marion Tasker was to visit the Gambia in the New Year to deliver the project and estimated that she would be able to provide pads for about 600 girls. Funds distributed in March 2023 were to be used to buy more material and this time they could afford to buy new electric sewing machines for the Gambian Pad Project. They

also very much appreciated that extension of an extra year's support.

Property - Moira Clark Convener - reported a recent focus on updating compliance requirements, which included: the fire drill which had preceded the Session meeting and will be repeated for other users; the emergency lighting tests to be carried out next week; lighting systems were done; PAT testing had been completed, the Electrical Installation Consolidation Report had been brought forward to early 2024 because there had been additional installations; fire alarm system to be tested possibly next week. Very high roof inspections had partly been completed and minor slate and gutter repairs carried out. However, the very high roof South East elevation inspection was still outstanding.

The works to remedy the roof leak had only been partially successful. The additional down pipe was successfully installed and sealant applied. Further water tests had been carried out which were generally successful and light rainfall poses no problem but heavy downpours as recently experienced result in huge amounts of water from the church roof and cause water ingress. The architect indicated in May that if the works carried out were not successful, he would give the matter further thought in consultation with the contractor. Moira was concerned that the consequence of these consultations might involve further material expense. In the meantime, the finalisation of the replacement of the panelling in the South corridors has been paused.

Cleaning - the re-appointment of an external cleaning firm has started and a significant improvement has been noted. The cleaners work in the early morning to 8.00am to allow an overlap with the caretakers' start time. The caretakers retain responsibility for the cleaning of the sanctuary and for any spot cleaning needed during opening hours. It was stressed that the caretakers had done a good job and saved the church money during the

period of the Covid pandemic and its aftermath when the contract cleaners were not employed but with extra work required with the return of multiple lets it was not possible for the caretakers alone to retain cleaning standards.

Review of the Roll – Fiona Stewart, Roll Keeper, advised that since the last Session there had been no changes and the roll stands at 350.

Presbytery Elders' Report – Robert Armour, Equalising Elder, reported that Presbytery returned from the summer break to the first of a cascade of demissions and unions that will be coming up in the last quarter of 2023.

The September meeting saw unions approved for Bathgate High and Bathgate St Johns: and for Fauldhouse St Andrews and Harthill St Andrews. We also saw demissions from the Ministers of St Giles, Currie, Kirknewton and East Calder, St David's Broomhouse and Linlithgow St Ninian's Craigmailen.

Presbytery approved a proposal to allow St Giles to charge visitors for entry. The burden of maintaining an historic national cathedral, which is a grade A medieval building as well as a major visitor attraction, puts a huge strain on the congregation. Unlike Glasgow Cathedral, it is not maintained by Historic Environment Scotland and visitors, though growing in numbers, are not always generous with donations. The insurance bill alone is £130,000 and the maintenance burden huge. So, like many cathedrals south of the border it is introducing a visitor entry charge.

Discussing the Presbytery Mission Plan, national guidance on drafting the documentation for unions had been issued as well as a guide on practical considerations prepared by Deployment committee. The report covered the need to get approvals from various national church bodies and also, as a result, the timescales involved in approving unions and the difficulty in making changes to the plan outside the annual plan review process.

Nevertheless, plan implementation is progressing. Three manses were being put up for sale. An associate minister post for Greyfriars was approved, reflecting the gap being created by the retiral of the current minister and his two assistants.

Any Other Competent Business -Wednesday Club - Charles Wilson reported that the Wednesday Club, which has been run by the church for almost 67 years, was in danger of having to close following the withdrawal of transport funded by the Council. As the Club receives no funding and is purely reliant on donations it was deemed that there were insufficient monies in the Club funds to provide transport. If this decision had had to be taken, it would have been with a heavy heart as for some of the men it is their only night out of the week. However, two generous anonymous benefactors have come forward to provide funding for the transport which will enable the Club to meet once a month from now until the end of its session in April.

The club formerly benefited from a retiring collection after the June communion and Session agreed that this should be reinstated. The club formerly received a grant from a restricted church fund and Session agreed that Charles Wilson and the Treasurer should investigate. It was noted that the club would continue to benefit from the donations received at the Telephone Choir Christmas concert.

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# **WORSHIP NOTES**

# All Saints - Sunday 5 November

Though not generally observed by the Church of Scotland until more recent times, All Saints Day is an ancient Christian festival which has its roots in the Early Middle Ages. From the fourth century, feasts commemorating Christian martyrs were held in various places and on various dates near Easter and Pentecost. In the ninth century some churches in Britain began holding the commemoration of all saints on or around 1 November. The Christian celebration of All Saints' Day stems from the developed belief that it is helpful to remember those in heaven, the 'Church triumphant', the living, the 'Church militant' and the 'Church penitent.

The Reformed tradition to which the Church of Scotland belongs does not believe that 'saints' have any powers in daily life, and that prayers to God are directed only through God's Son, Jesus Christ. The season, sitting generally within a time of remembrance, gives us an opportunity to remember and give thanks for those 'saints' who have helped shape the life of faith, and our own lives.

In English-speaking countries services often include the singing of the traditional hymn, 'For all the saints' by Walsham How. The most familiar tune for this hymn is *Sine Nomine* by Ralph Vaughan Williams.

**Remembrance Sunday, 12 November, 10.45am** in the Church. There will be no 9.30am service that day.

# The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper

The next communion service will be on Sunday 3 December, which is also the first Sunday of Advent.

At the end of September, we were delighted to engage in a joint project with Heart for Art for our latest Dementia Friendly concert featuring a return visit from the string quartet who played for us last year, now aptly named 'Heart Strings' for this special occasion. The combination of arts was very potent we had an excellent audience to share 'the experience'. The accomplished string players are all former members of the National Youth Orchestra of Scotland and play together regularly in Glasgow and in Edinburgh. The artistic background of the beautiful Heart for Art Exhibition served as a fitting enhancement to the beauty of the music.

The varied programme ranged from light classics to Dvorak's American String Quartet, something for everyone to enjoy. The players introduced the works being performed with appropriate chat and audience engagement with a competition thrown in for good measure. The encore was a rather special arrangement of the Irish folk tune 'Danny Boy', a fitting ending to a wonderful afternoon.

The post-concert refreshments were welcome and greatly enjoyed by the large audience and performers. We hope to build on this success in our future concerts. 
