At the end of November, we were delighted to offer a weekend of choral singing, a virtual Two Choirs Festival, with two very different but equally engaging choirs participating.

Our first visit from the impressive Edinburgh Rock Choir was amazing, with wonderful zest and energy shown in their varied programme of beautiful singing with their dynamic conductor, Elaine Williamson, who introduced and presented every item with infectious and engaging humour throughout. After a rousing start, the programme was wide ranging with hints of Christmas to come in the 'Carol of the Bells' and 'I Wish it could be Christmas Every Day' as a feel-good encore. The concert attracted a huge audience who filled the church and who were invited to 'sing and dance' as well as clapping mostly in time to 'Loco in Acapulco'.



The following day, we were delighted to welcome back the Chamber Choir from George Heriot's School under the inspiring direction of Judith Buttars with wonderful organ playing by Graham Maclagan. We particularly enjoyed the input from cheerful school age pupils and they in turn brought



many parents and friends to swell the audience. Lovely to have a beautiful piano solo by Emily Macfarlane, one of our Morningside Parish Church Choral Scholars, playing Einaudi's haunting 'I Giorni' and Philippa Burgess performing Ian Clark's 'Sunstreams' as an evocative flute solo

accompanied by Graham MacLagan. We enjoyed some stunning choral works including Howard Goodall's atmospheric 'Love Divine' and Andrew Carter's 'Mary's Magnificat'. Again we had some early Christmas Music and the chance to join in a few well-chosen carols with organ and choir accompaniment.

We enjoyed post-concert refreshments on both days. A special thank you to catering and door staff for assisting with the two concerts as well as church staff and Alistair Keil for his warm words on both occasions. Douglas Paterson's excellent photography throughout the year is so much appreciated and thank you to the Tor Foundation and Morningside Parish Church for their invaluable support.

We hope you have enjoyed our five Dementia Friendly concerts in 2023 and we look forward to welcoming you back in March 2024. We start on Saturday 2 March at 2pm with an organ recital by Morley Whitehead, our accomplished Church Organist and Choir Master, who gave us a memorable concert last year. It will be great to welcome him back to start our 2024 series.

Other highlights in the planning include a Scottish Traditional Music Concert in May, and a proposed Musical Pilgrimage in September should be an exciting musical venture. Thank you for all the wonderful support we have received and we look forward to welcoming you again later in 2024.

We thought it a good idea this year to invite the other three churches that we are aiming to form closer relationships with to decorate a tree. This was successful – in addition to their attractive trees - in

bringing in visitors from their congregations.

The trees were up for longer than last year, the weather was kinder and the event provided a lot of pleasure to a large number of people. Apart from those who came specifically for the festival, a large number of people rent our sanctuary at this time and all commented favourably. A

particular highlight was the singing from the Buckstone Community Choir whose sound and company were much appreciated.

Our craft stall was well stocked with a wide variety of seasonal items some of it made by house bound members - and many visitors took the opportunity to buy.





We thank William Purves who generously provided the trees for the second time and those who participated by decorating their trees so imaginatively to publicise the work of their organisations. It was not primarily intended as a fundraiser but we made £1,862 which will be donated to the church's charities.

TRULY FAITHFUL STEWARDS – Many thanks to all our Crafters at MPC – the Craft Stall at the Christmas Tree was **SUPERB**. We are tremendously lucky to have a church full of many talented people ready and willing to contribute their wares – take a bow! At the last count I think it raised in excess of £700. Extremely well done all of you. Can you start again now for next year please?

KIRK SESSION NEWS

The Kirk Session met in December:

December Communion: The Moderator reported that the December Communion Service had offered the Common Cup which had been much appreciated by those who wished it. It was proposed and agreed that this should be the pattern for future 10.30 am quarterly Communions.

Presbytery Plan: The Moderator advised that it had now been established that there had been a misunderstanding between Presbytery which had referred only to a "collaboration" between the 4 churches. However, Deployment of Resources Committee had always intended that any proposal acceptable to the Presbytery and the central authority at 121 should include at least one or more unions albeit the union(s) could be deferred unions. However, notwithstanding several meetings with Presbytery representatives, this had never been clear until the Moderator had pressed for clarification.

The approved Presbytery Plan indicates the group will be served by three full-time Ministers of Word and Sacrament (which we currently have due to the vacancy at Greenbank), along with locally appointed staff. Under the plan, all four church buildings will be retained. What has now to be discussed is what number of unions will take place as a number of options are available - from one or two unions of two leaving respectively two or none independent; or one union of three leaving one independent; or a grand union of all four.

In practice, it will not be possible for a congregation to be served by a locally funded (as opposed to centrally funded) minister as such a minister would be an employee of the Session and because of a conflict of interest could not act as Moderator of that Session. This option is not therefore available to Greenbank.

A date for the next meeting of representatives of the four churches and Presbytery has now been set for 8 February 2024.

Staff: Robin Stimpson, convener, reported that the main staffing change this year was prompted by the resignation of Jan Goulding as Office Administrator. After advertising and interviewing, Leigh Malaihollo was offered the job and is providing excellent leadership and efficiency in the Church Office. Her working hours were increased from 25 to 30 to cover the wide range of work needing attention.

The caretaking team, Steven Watson and Phil McPhail, continue to work well together, liaise closely with Leigh and provide the church and its tenants with a welcoming and helpful oversight. During the Pandemic, and until recently, the caretakers took over the work of cleaning, as of course usage of our halls was reduced. However, with the return of tenants and indeed additional lets arranged, it became clear that it was impossible for them to maintain standards to their and the church's satisfaction. We are however grateful to them both for taking on the cleaning during the Pandemic and in the process saving the church money. Cleaning work has once again been outsourced to a cleaning company but the caretakers have retained responsibility for the sanctuary and also for "top up" cleaning during the hours the building is open.

The Church Officer, Alex Bleck, continues diligently to perform the role of Church Officer and is always willing, helpful and friendly.

Jacqui Lindsay continues to perform with excellence the role of Pastoral Assistant and has not only developed the role of the work under the umbrella of Morningside Hope but has raised significant funds towards its continuation after the current three year grant expires. Funds have been raised by a range of concerts which, as well as fundraising, being "dementia friendly" are also much enjoyed by the large numbers of attendees.

The results of the Heart for Art scheme were displayed in the church at a concert and at the service the next day, to the delight of the artists whose talent had been developed or rekindled and also to the appreciation of those privileged to view their works.

Morley Whitehead continues to enjoy the role as Organist and Choirmaster and each year recruits and trains choral scholars and its longstanding members to provide a high standard of choral work. He too continues to be involved in raising funds by his regular programme of three lunchtime concerts during the Edinburgh Festival. Money so raised complements funds from the Friends of Morningside and individual donors.

Annual staff appraisals will be carried out in the New Year.

Stewardship and Finance: Chris McNeil, Treasurer, had circulated a draft budget for 2024 which had been previously scrutinised and agreed with the committee. He highlighted the following - FWO budget had been increased by £20k in anticipation of the Stewardship campaign proposed in the Spring; a 5% increase is proposed for new lets in 2024; investment income was likely to drop as withdrawals had been made from capital. On expenditure, he noted that inflation had increased by 47% in the last 5 years which continued to impact on costs. He was pleased to note that the installation of the "Hallmaster" computer programme in the office had allowed more effective rendering and recovery of rents. He noted a donation of £5K from the Friends of MPC towards the funding of choral scholars and reported that the number of scholars would be limited to 8 in 2024.

Compared to 2023, budget increases were highlighted in - Staff salaries by £5,500; cleaning costs by £15,000 as we return to employing a cleaning firm; heat and light by £8,000 with an increase in utility costs following the end of the very favourable fixed rate negotiated for the last four years by the General Trustees, the new negotiated rate

being 70% greater than before; and overall, the net deficit will increase by just over £5,000. There is in addition a substantial contingency of £51,200 for one off property maintenance costs.

The Moderator commented that following the completion of building works in 2019 and the period of the Pandemic, the investment in the buildings is beginning to pay off through rentals. However, it was recognised that inflation was impacting on everyone's budget. After discussion, Session approved the accounts.

The Moderator thanked the Treasurer and the Stewardship & Finance committee for their work in preparing the budget and general supervision of the church's finances throughout the year.

Presbytery Elder: Robin Stimpson reported on the meeting of the Presbytery of Edinburgh and West Lothian on 5th December.

The December Presbytery meeting began with the celebration of Communion before addressing a wide range of business.

Presbytery Plan - By far the greatest proportion of the business was in relation to the Presbytery Plan. Authority was given for a number of redundant manses to be sold.

However, it was noted that because one congregation has requested a formal review of the approved Presbytery Mission Plan, regrettably the plan was not yet signed off. The Deployment Committee has provided two sets of required paperwork within the timescales given. The process began in July 2023 and Presbytery sent its information to the Office of the Principal Clerk on 4 August 2023. A review panel was set up at the beginning of September but no ruling has yet been received. "The Deployment Committee is greatly concerned and disappointed that the timescales have meant that several congregations have not been able to move forward towards adjustment or implementation as a result"

Notwithstanding the above delay, some congregations have been able to proceed with unions proposed by the plan – Breich Valley with Whitburn South; Blackburn and Seafield with Whitburn Brucefield; Abercorn with Pardovan, Kingscavil and Winchburgh.

The proposed union of Gracemount, Liberton, Liberton Northfield, Reid Memorial and Tron Kirk Moredun/Gilmerton in a team ministry has had to be reviewed as, although all the others agreed, Reid Memorial has rejected the proposal. It is now proposed that the union will proceed without Reid Memorial and further conversations will be had with Reid Memorial.

One of the shortest but most encouraging and dignified statements came from the interim

moderator of Bathgate St John's Church. In the proposed union of the Bathgate churches. St John's had not been chosen to be the church used. The interim moderator reported that they were devastated by that decision, but accepted it and were determined to work together to make a success of the union.

Retirement of James Byers – after many years in the role of Presbytery Treasurer, James has intimated his resignation. He said that officially he had held the role "at the pleasure of the Presbytery" but the reality was that the pleasure had been his. His short speech was greeted with prolonged applause.

OUR NEW INTERNATIONAL CHARITY

As you may already be aware from the Sunday intimations, the time has come to change the international charity supported as one of our three charities. The chosen charity is The David Nott Foundation https://davidnottfoundation.com/ which delivers Trauma Medical Training for doctors serving in areas affected by natural disasters or wars, thereby enabling them to save more lives.

David Nott is a general and vascular surgeon working for the NHS in major London Hospitals. For more than 25 years he took periods of unpaid leave to volunteer in some of the world's most dangerous war zones including Sarajevo under siege in 1993, spells in Afghanistan and in clandestine hospitals in Aleppo. At various times he worked for the British Red Cross and Médécin Sans Frontières. However, his experiences led him to observe that, while it was useful for him to bring his skills to these areas, his time in these locations was limited and more could be achieved for the wounded if he spent time training local doctors who were perfectly competent in peacetime but lacked the necessary specialised skills to deal with injuries resulting from wars or natural disasters.

The charity set up by David Nott uses a diverse mix of teaching methods and materials led by a world class faculty of experienced and distinguished surgeons, including using the internet and bringing doctors to the UK for brief training experience. Their vision is a global network of medical professionals providing the best care to patients in austere or hostile environments.

None of us can fail to be moved by the daily reports on the television and in newspapers of the suffering of people of all ages as a result of wars or natural disasters. Support of this charity will mean that we don't just sympathise with their plight but in a small way do something to help alleviate the problem.

BACK TO BASICS WITH NUTRITION - A TALK BY DR NEIL MILLIKEN

MUSICAL NOTES



Some readers may remember the publication, a few years back, of a copy of "Choir Regulations, St Matthew's Parish Church, May 1911" (found pasted into the flyleaf of an old anthem book.) I may have

written something along the lines of: some things don't change much...

On a fairly recent visit to a famous church in East Lothian, I found the following attached to the back of the organ case, and so facing into the choir's robing area. It is, I guess, just a little "tongue in cheek", but there is a grain or two of truth in it too, I shouldn't wonder:

CHOIR RULES IN THE GOOD OLD DAYS, circa 1915.

- i) The practice shall commence at 8.30 or at such later time as a sufficient number shall have gathered together. Members are thought more of if they arrive late.
- ii) The choir meets one evening a week for the following purposes: to discuss politics, tennis, scandal and/or church affairs; to arrange socials, excursions, etc., and of course, to flirt. N.B. If there is any time not occupied in the foregoing manner, and, if the members feel so inclined, it might be desirable to engage in a little singing.
- iii) The choir shall consist of sopranos, altos, tenors and basses. All those ladies who cannot read music shall sing alto. Should any lady with a high-pitched voice object to singing alto, she is recommended to consult a voice specialist, who will be almost certain to pronounce that she is a deep contralto with a faulty method of voice production.

- iv) The tenors shall consist of as many fair gentlemen[sic] who do not mind straining their voices. All gentlemen left over shall sing bass. Basses are at liberty to sing tenor if they feel that their extensive compass is not being duly recognised. He must be a poor worm of a bass who cannot sing tenor if he likes.
- v) No notice shall be taken of the conductor. Do not trouble to look at his beat. He should tap. What your neighbour is saying is of far greater importance and interest.
- v) The conductor is always pleased to receive advice from individual members. He likes to receive hints about choir management, suggestions as to tempo and expression and is delighted to be instructed in the elements of musical grammar. If you think he has made a mistake, please tell him so.
- vi) Members of the choir are recommended to take home copies of the music to look over at their leisure. It doesn't really matter if the music is not returned, as choir funds are flourishing and further copies can always be purchased.

Thank goodness that things are not like this(!) at MPC.
