Dear Friends

One of the moments I enjoy most in our Sunday services (and there are many) is when one of our young people comes forward to read the opening prayer. I enjoy writing the prayer for them, trying to imagine what they might want to say, and how they might want to say it. Choosing the right words, and shaping

them into a prayerful moment not only for the young person reading but also for the whole congregation. I fondly hope that by including our young people in worship in this way, as well as encouraging them to add their 'stand and deliver' methodology to collecting the offering (!), we plant seeds of faith and belief which will in later years grow into an adult faith of their own. The experience

of being involved in worship, however small, can be transformative. We play our own small part in the offering of worship which we make to God.

I remember as a 7 year old choir boy singing a solo part in Hugh S Roberton's 'All in the April Evening' in St Mungo's, Penicuik, and being told, "Do your very best, it's for God, you know!" Which could have been a heavy burden to bear, but somehow it caught my young imagination and, when I came into ministry years later, that concept of doing my

best because it is for God comes back to me again and again. When I fail and when I succeed, it is for me an encouragement.

Sunday worship is only one way in which we can make a contribution to God's Kingdom on earth today. There can be times it feels like a huge burden, with so much needing to be

done. But I hope also for those who are active in their faith in practical ways, in spiritual ways like prayer, there is also that sense of enormous privilege.

It's not hard to imagine the delight of God as we bring our best and offer it up, when we have tried, and very often succeeded in doing the right thing at the right time and in the right spirit.

Which is why it is so important to encourage our young people to begin on this road of serving and being involved, and maybe, just maybe, planting words of faith in their lives that will be warmed by the positive encouragement of the congregation. May it also be the same for those in their adult years, that sense of involvement in whatever we do for church and community. "Do your very best, it's for God, you know!"

KIRK SESSION NEWS

The Kirk Session met in May:

Presbytery Reform – The Moderator advised that since Session last met there had been no further discussion, but a meeting was scheduled to take place on Wednesday 15th May between ministerial representatives and the Session Clerks from each of Morningside, Greenbank and Fairmilehead and the Revd Dr Stewart Weaver, Convenor and Jane Smart a member of the Deployment of Resources Committee of the Presbytery.

The Moderator reported that the Revd Julia Cato had finished as Associate at Greenbank, and the Revd Ian Gilmour will act as locum, and the Revd Moira Macdonald will take over from the Revd Dorothy Anderson as Interim Moderator.

Robert Armour who is on the Presbytery's Deployment of Resources Committee advised that progress was being made with the plan and many unions and linkages were progressing. The whole plan will be reviewed later this year when not only will any necessary adjustments be made but proposed Mission Plans will be reviewed.

The Moderator reminded Session that these difficult adjustments were necessary because of the shortage of ministers – it is known that over 50% of ministers are over 60, and 2% over 70.

Health & Safety Committee - Moira Clark Convenor reported -

The risk assessments in place are being reviewed at present to ensure they are relevant and complete. The Health and Safety plan has been updated and Fire Plan will also be reviewed. The annual walk round of the building has been completed, as has the fire Risk assessment, and several issues have been identified that need addressed.

As ever, Health and Safety concerns us all

Church Security and pending Legislative Changes – The General Trustees have alerted us to a new U.K. Parliamentary bill regarding security of church buildings. Martyn's Law, as it is being referred to, concerns the ongoing security and control measures within places of worship, under the Terrorism (Protection of Premises) Bill 2023. Although the legislation is still currently within its final consultation period, the supplementary additions to the church security sections aim to ensure that presbytery and congregations can suitably access the training material and government guidance and evaluate the security at their buildings and start to put in place their localised policies and procedures. Overall, we appear to be in many respects compliant, but possible training requirements and present practices will require to be reviewed.

Communication – In her absence, Isobel Paterson had submitted a report advising that the Communications Group proposed that a **Christmas Tree Festival** be held from Saturday 7th - Saturday 14th December 10.00am - 2.00pm. People who have decorated trees will be invited to do so again but some may wish to "take a break" this year. William Purves, local undertakers, have again agreed to pay for the trees.

She advised that this is not primarily a fundraising event, but the Session's agreement was sought, and given, that any money raised be split between the **Palestine Children's Relief Fund** and the **Wednesday Club**.

Stewardship & Finance – the leaflet relating to a Review of Giving had been sent to the printers and arrangements were in hand to mail it to members. The cost of mailing has been donated.

Wednesday Club for the Disabled – Charles Wilson had circulated a full history of the club since its inception in 1956. As well as meetings at the church, traditionally the Club has provided a summer holiday for the men. result of changes in legislation relating to the requirements needed for transport and accommodation of disabled people it has been reduced to day outings. Specialised transport is needed and was formerly provided, free of charge, by the City of Edinburgh Council both for the meetings at the church and for the summer trips. However, in 2023, a change in Council policy saw the withdrawal of transport for community groups. Since their inception, the outings have been provided to the members free of charge; the cost of admission to the venues, and catering costs have been covered by Club funds derived from the grant from Morningside Parish Church (£650 since 2003), a retiring collection taken after the June Communion (variable amount) and the proceeds of the fund-raising Carol Concert performed by The Edinburgh Telephone Choir in December each year (variable amount). As the Club is now having to pay for the transport for the outings, is incurring escalating costs in catering and is being faced with increasing admission fees, the Session was asked and agreed to an increase in the grant from £650 to £800.

Presbytery Elder's report - A meeting of Presbytery took place on 30th April.

Presbytery Plan – A great deal of routine but necessary business was speedily dealt with, again, by far the greatest proportion of the business arising from the consequences of the Presbytery Plan including – Authority was given for the sale of redundant manses and the purchase of replacements compliant with the necessary C rated EPC (Energy Performance Certificate).

The union of **Colinton & Juniper Green** was approved. The new congregation will be known as the Pentland Parish Church.

The Revd Julia Cato, formerly Associate Minister at Greenbank, has been called to serve as minister of the Northwest Kirk (formerly Cramond and Old Kirk & Muirhouse) and will be inducted on 30th May.

A new united charge of **Craigmillar Park**, **Mayfield Salisbury and Priestfield** is proposed (the name for the new congregation yet to be approved). The Kirk Session of Reid Memorial having voted against joining this grouping are now in conversations with the Deployment Committee who hope to bring proposals for an amendment to the Presbytery Mission Plan to a future meeting of the Presbytery later this year

The Revd Daniel Carmichael has been appointed as Depute Clerk to the Presbytery from 12th June 2024

WORSHIP NOTES

The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper will be shared on Sunday 2nd June at 9.30am and 10.30am in the Church. At the 10.30am service, the Minister will conduct the service, and we will welcome back as our guest preacher the **Revd Dr Conor Fegan**, Minister of Markinch in Fife. Conor spent his probationary period with us during the Covid Pandemic, and consequently hardly ever got to see the whole congregation during his time because of Lockdown. It will be good to welcome him back to preach.

DAVID CALDER - A TRIBUTE

The death of David Calder, one of our most active and much-loved elders, came as a great shock to everyone in the congregation and wider Morningside Parish Church family. It is hard to imagine Church life without his warm and cheery smile. Amongst the most persistent words to describe him has been, 'jolly'. He was such a positive, helpful, caring and supportive human being.

Born in Edinburgh, educated at South Morningside Primary School, he went on to become a proud Watsonian. Thereafter he happily went out into what he

called 'the University of Life'. He was a devoted son and brother, and a loving husband to Kim. David was not only well-known in Church, he was also a kenspeckle figure in Morningside, and enjoyed frequenting his 'office and meeting room' at the conspiratorial table (as he called it) at the Canny Man's.

In our Church you would often see him walking at speed along the Braid Hall corridor on a Sunday morning, making it in time, just for the 9.30am Early Service. Or he would be found at the back of the sanctuary controlling the iPad as one of the team who help us broadcast our 10.30am service. As well as his elder duties (he was a diligent and endlessly helpful and kind district elder), David served on the Kirk Session's Worship, Social and Outreach Committees. At all events where we served wine, David as our licensee was always to hand, making sure glasses were kept appropriately filled. He, along with the Minister, conducted a 'tasting' for the wine we serve at Communion, which was a fairly extensive piece of research!

David helped with the Wednesday Club, Morningside Hope, all of the social events at Church, and the Wednesday Coffee morning where he was a stalwart. He was a one-man welcoming team, and anyone coming to Church on Sunday or to any of our other events will remember with fondness and appreciation the warmth of his welcome.

No one other than the Minister witnessed David's heroics when, at one Christmas Day service, the Minister saw from the pulpit that one of the decorations on a church pillar had caught fire, in the days when we still used real candles. Praying with extra fervour, the Minister thanked Almighty God for His great love, which like an undying flame that never goes out, warms and illuminates everyone like the brightest of fires. David looked up, saw the Minister pointing to the flambéed decoration which was well alight, moved quietly along the pew, and whilst the congregation prayed on, oblivious to the drama, took the flaming object off the wall, out of the sanctuary and into the light snow which had fallen that morning, burning his hands en route.

Tributes to David have come in from friends from the Church, from across Edinburgh, and from across the world. His loss to us in Morningside, and to Kim especially, will be immense. But what wonderful memories we will have of this kindly, compassionate, faithful gentle-man.

For those who knew David well, they would know that hands were important to David. It was never clear whether or not he ever owned a diary. All he would do would be to write down notes on the back of his hand, and on busy days he would 'turn the page' and write on his other hand. In the corridor opposite the pigeon holes one of the collection of hands in a photo montage includes David. Writing clearly visible on one hand, and a glass of wine in the other.

For these, and for so many more memories, we give thanks to God for this faithful servant.




AFTERNOON TEA

Your way home, understood now, not as an achievement, but as a giving up, a blessed undoing, an arrival in the body and a full rest in the give


in the give and take of the breath.
