KIRK SESSION NEWS

The Kirk Session met in June:

Wednesday Club Finances - Charles Wilson reported that a small grant of £1,130 has been secured from the Provincial Grand Lodge of Edinburgh and three smaller local lodges which meet in Morningside towards the club's summer outings. The Club is very appreciative of the time and effort incurred by Jacqui Lindsay in securing this funding. The retiring collection after the June communion amounted to £217 and since Session last met an anonymous donation of £1500 and two further donations amounting to £50 have been received. Together with the Holiday Grant of £800 approved by Session this will allow the Club to proceed with the proposed summer outings and provide some working capital for the winter session. The funding of the winter session will be augmented by donations from the Christmas Tree Festival and the Telephone Choir concert which should allow the Club to meet once per month from October to April. Looking forward, the Club will have to source external funding to continue the services it provides.

Presbytery Reform – The Moderator introduced the main item of business which was the proposal concerning the **possibilities** of a future union with Greenbank Parish Church and the formation of a Parish Grouping between the union and Fairmilehead Parish Church. The proposal came from a small working group which has representatives from the three churches and the Presbytery's Deployment Committee.

The Moderator described that, in essence, the suggested proposal was;

- a union between MPC and GB;
- one governing body (a Kirk Session) to govern the united congregation with the possibility of a revamp of the committee structure;
- the Kirk Session to be moderated by Dr Browning
- a local appointment (who could be a minister but an employee) to be made by the new Kirk Session with responsibilities in Greenbank and Morningside, exact duties to be discussed;
- Morningside and Greenbank union both buildings to be retained;
- Fairmilehead to be associated in a parish grouping, but not part of the union;
- (St John's Colinton Mains Parish Church will be placed in a different grouping, so no longer a part of this proposal.)

The Moderator stressed that the proposal was from the local group and had not been either to Presbytery or the National Church for approval. He also stressed that this proposal would have to be discussed and agreed by the Greenbank and Fairmilehead Kirk Sessions as the possible basis for future discussions. This may well be only the beginning of our discussions and there was still some considerable way to go, and the Moderator stressed that what was proposed was **not** a decision. Bearing all this in mind, and very conscious of the sensitivities around this topic for all three congregations, the Moderator then invited Session to vote on the proposal and possibilities set out in the paper on Deployment and it received the unanimous support of Session as a possible way to begin to move forward.

Stewardship & Finance – Robert Armour, convener, showed to Session the large bag of mixed foreign coin and notes donated for Christian Aid by local congregations. The various denominations will now be counted and the amount raised identified and passed to Christian Aid.

WORSHIP NOTES

9.30am Early Services resume on Sunday 1 September in the Cluny Hall. This half hour service allows for a more reflective time of worship, where responsive prayers and a short talk help us focus on the theme for the day.

We currently have two pianists who help provide the music at this service and we are looking for more to help share the responsibility. If you, or someone you know, might like to help, please contact the Minister.

Harvest Thanksgiving will be held on Sunday 29 September. This will be an all-age service. We will have our usual appeal for goods for the South East Edinburgh Foodbank.

The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper will be shared on Sunday 8 October at 9.30am and 10.30am in the Church.

HARVEST FOODBANK COLLECTION


For many years our Church has been supporting the Blythswood Care SE Edinburgh Foodbank, based at Southhouse Broadway. Throughout the year, donations can be placed in the container beneath the pigeonholes in the Braid corridor, but our biggest effort in contributing to the Foodbank's work is directed towards donating foodstuffs and toiletries at the Harvest Service, to be held this year on 29th September.

The Foodbank serves the EH16 and EH17 postal areas and issues food parcels to those who have been referred by support agencies, the health sector, schools and other charitable bodies. Since the start of the year, food parcels have been issued to almost 2200 clients, of which 43% are children. Giving support to those in need is vital, but stocks are running low as the increasing cost of foodstuffs has resulted in donations not keeping pace with the rise in demand.

This year there is a particular shortage of the following items, so donations of these goods would be particularly welcome – tinned meat, fruit, tomatoes, custard and rice pudding, cartons of fruit juice and UHT semi-skimmed milk and toilet rolls. The Foodbank also requires carrier bags, into which the goods for the clients are placed, so donations of these would also be appreciated. Please hand in any donations at the Braid Hall immediately before the 10.30am Service

The Foodbank cannot accept fresh fruit or vegetables or jars of homemade jam. Also, please do remember when donating any items that they must be in date. If you would prefer to make a financial donation to allow the Foodbank to make its own purchases, cash can be handed in to the Foodbank at 47 Southhouse Broadway, EH17 8AS between 10am-1.30pm Monday, Tuesday and Thursdays. In the past, the congregation has always responded so positively to this appeal and so thank you in advance for your continued generosity this year.

THOMAS CHALMERS - TALK

Wednesday 25 September, 3pm, Braid Hall

Earlier in the year the Minister gave a talk about Thomas Chalmers, "Chief Scottish man". Chalmers was an influential C19th Church of Scotland minister who was one of the chief movers behind the Disruption of the Church of Scotland in 1843 and the formation of the Free Church of Scotland. Latterly he lived in Churchill and was a member of the original Morningside Parish Church. He is buried in the Grange Cemetery.

Chalmers' career saw him ministering in different parts of the country, as well as holding several professorial roles at St Andrews and Edinburgh Universities. He was Moderator of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland, and the first Moderator of the Free Church of Scotland.

Not everyone was able to attend the evening meeting when the Minister first gave this talk, so here is an afternoon meeting for those who might like to come, on Wednesday 25th September, 3pm, Braid Hall


